


The overall property has lost the integrity necessary to represent the country estates that historically lined Rockville Pike (Criteria 1a)


- The existing 26.43 acres parcel is a suburban office park incorporating an historic dwelling and
 - 2 major office buildings
 - 2 Paved parking lots
 - Realigned and expanded access roads with parking areas

- Staff report provides a chronology of the changes to the original estate over time
- These changes fall into two categories:
 - 1. Those that decreased the parcel from its edges with minor impact to the site;
 - Interior changes that created the current office campus, which changed both the use and architectural character of the site as a whole.

- <1981 the overall plan of the estate was intact
 - The main house dominated the site plan
 - Access roads were limited to a main drive
 - Spatial relationships between elements survived
 - Important landscape features, such as the pond were still evident



- The 2 office buildings, parking lots, and access roads changed the historic character of the estate
 - The office complex became the focus of the site plan and over shadowed the main house





- Meet the standard for historical and architectural significance established in the Historic Preservation Ordinance;
- 1980s Office Development has altered the architectural character of the original estate to a suburban office campus that incorporates a domestic complex with a substantially reduced setting.
- The appropriate environmental setting is the open space immediately to the front and rear of the domestic complex.
