Prior Evaluations of Significance

- □ Wild Acres appears in Roger Brook Farquhar, Jr.'s 1962 Old Homes and History of Montgomery County, Maryland
- □ Included as a potential historic property in the *Locational Atlas and Index of Historic Sites*, published 1976
- Surveyed and documented as significant by Sugarloaf Regional Trails for the Maryland Historical Trust, 1978
- Determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places for its historical and architectural significance by Federal Highway Administration and Maryland Historical Trust, 2000
- Historic significance highlighted in a December 1981 article in *Journal of Forestry* by Barry Walden Walsh, an SAF staff writer, entitled *Historic Wild Acres*. Contained photo of colonial boundary marker with carved initials of early owner

Historical and Cultural Significance: (1)a. has character, interest or value as part of the development, heritage or cultural characteristics of the county...

- □ Wild Acres is representative of the country estates which grew up along Rockville Pike in the early 20th century
- □ Rockville-Chevy Chase became popular with wealthy Washingtonians after area made accessible with establishment of trolley car and improvements to Pike
- Ranks among finest, alongside 1914 Classical Revival Corby Estate, designed for Charles Corby, a bread manufacturer & inventor; 1931 monumental Beaux Arts style Marwood House, designed for Samuel K. Martin III, heir to a Chicago fortune; and 1927-28 Woodend, another Classical Revival mansion designed for Chester Wells, naval officer, and wife Marian Wells, an Australian heiress





The Manor House

- Fine example of Tudor Revival architecture, reflecting earlier and later styles in two asymmetrical sections—half-timbering with stucco in-fill on the shorter east end and uncoursed rubblestone on the longer west end
- Asymmetrical appearance more pronounced on north elevation, with windows arranged as singles, pairs and triplets; more classical symmetrical on southern elevation
- □ Views of sweeping lawns and trees planted by the Grosvenors to attract birds on both elevations





















The Carriage House

- □ Designed as a visual extension of the east section of manor house—false half-timbering with stucco in-fill
- □ On same East-West axis as house
- □ Built at the same time
- Clearly intended as an integral component of the house








Architectural Drawings of Carriage House (South Elevation)




The Gardener's Cottage

- □ Built in 1913 for caretaker to look after estate in winter when unheated farm house not in use by Grosvenors
- □ Designed by Arthur B. Heaton in Craftsman style characterized by practical, simple design, in reaction to the elaborate ornamentation of the Victorian-era houses
- □ Design elements include exposed rafter tails and beam ends and a cut-away porch



Architectural and Design Significance: (2)b represents the work of a master

- □ Wild Acres designed by Arthur Berthrong Heaton (1875-1951), a prominent architect for 50 years
- □ Heaton held many important posts—Supervisory architect of the Washington Cathedral and Associate Architect for George Washington University
- □ Prodigious and varied output—major work for successful real estate developer Shannon & Luchs (more than 500 residences for them in Burleith); many homes in Cleveland Park in D.C., several apartment buildings, small commercial buildings, school
- □ Early car enthusiast—designed nationally acclaimed Park and Shop in Cleveland Park and one of earliest commercial automobile parking garages, the now demolished Capital Garage.

Architectural and Design Significance: (2)b represents the work of a master (cont.)

- Heaton was known for a variety of eclectic academic revival architectural styles—remodeled Corby mansion on Chevy Chase Circle in Tudor Revival style and designed National Geographic buildings on 16th St. in D.C. in Italian Renaissance style
- Leader of "renovize Washington" during Depression--led to his role as founder of Washington Building Congress; active in Washington Board of Trade; served as President of Washington Chapter of American Institute of Architects in 1935
- □ He was honored as a Fellow of the AIA, one of highest honors an American architect can be afforded by his/her peers
- □ Heaton was well known to Gilbert Grosvenor from social connections to GWU and the Cosmos Club

Historical Integrity of Estate

- The historic resources of the property—the mansion house, garage and caretaker's house—contribute to the historic and architectural importance of the property
- □ Wild Acres retains a high degree of historic integrity of location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, feeling and association
- Although the extent of the estate's historic acreage has been diminished substantially from the original 110 acres purchased by the Grosvenors, the acreage encompassed by this nomination retains sufficient integrity to convey the estate's historic semi-rural, suburban character
- The two modern office buildings on an adjacent parcel have been sensitively sited and compatibly detailed, thus not detracting significantly from the immediate historic environment of the house.
- These resources combined with their intact immediate historic acreage convey the property's significance as a relatively rare Tudor Revival style country estate designed by a master architect and built between the wars in outlying Montgomery County for a prominent Washington family

Conclusion – Wild Acres Qualifies for Master Plan for Historic Preservation

- □ Unusual survivor of estate carved out of farmland during the pre-suburban period of Bethesda's history Ch. 24A-3(1)a.
- Home for 40 years of Gilbert H. Grosvenor and Elsie May Bell Grosvenor, influential Editor of the National Geographic Magazine and President of the National Geographic Society—Ch. 24A-3(1)c.
- House and garage are excellent examples of Tudor Revival design typical of wealthy country estates of end of 19th century and early 20th century; gardener's cottage is prime example of Craftsman style of the period—Ch. 24A-3(2)a.
- □ Designed by a master architect Arthur B. Heaton—Ch. 24A-3(2)b.
- □ Integrity of resources has been successfully retained
