STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Approval.

PROJECT SUMMARY

The applicant, Built by Beavers LLC (dba Montgomery Dive Club (MDC)), is currently contracted by the Montgomery County Recreation Department (MCRD) to manage all county springboard and platform diving programs. These diving programs are nationally recognized for excellence, and have been hamstrung by a lack of dryland training facilities. According to the partnership proposal submitted by the MDC, the top divers in the world spend 50% of their training time in a gymnasium setting. Currently, there is no dedicated dryland diving training facility anywhere in Montgomery County, and the MDC has been conducting its dryland training on the pool deck at the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center (KSAC) in Wall Park.

The public-private partnership proposal submitted by the MDC/Built by Beavers LLC and supported by MCRD and the MDC Boosters non-profit organization would repurpose the underutilized, standalone enclosed handball courts adjacent to the KSAC in Wall Park and convert them into a multi-purpose acrobatics and gymnastics facility that would be used to provide dryland diving training for their popular programs. The handball courts would be outfitted with trampolines, bungee harnesses, dry diving boards, a spring floor, and digital video replay monitors.

The establishment of this facility would alleviate existing deck space constraints at KSAC and allow for existing program growth, creation of new programs, hosting of special events, and the creation of educational opportunities for the local acrobatics community.

The cost of the proposed improvements and the ongoing operational costs will be covered in full by the applicant.

BACKGROUND/RATIONALE

In September 2011, a new process was introduced to manage the intake of unsolicited public-private partnership proposals. This process established "filter" criteria all applicants are required to meet to ensure unsolicited proposals align with the Parks mission and cover costs. A \$1000 application fee was also instituted to cover the cost of the extensive staff review time required by these proposals. Staff in the Public Affairs & Community Partnerships Division manages this new intake process, providing guidance and recommendations to prospective partners to assist with the preparation of proposals and coordinating internally with staff during the review.

The Wall Park Dryland Diving Training Facility proposal was submitted by the MDC in February 2012. The proposal was reviewed within the allotted 60 day window and given preliminary approval to proceed by all divisions and the Parks Directorate in April 2012. A copy of the original proposal is attached (please note: the proprietary financial information submitted with the original proposal has been withheld from this public packet and provided to the Planning Board in a separate confidential addendum).

The proposed project satisfies the five criteria established through the new public-private partnership process, as outlined below:

1. Alignment with park priorities

- a. Supports the Park mission by offering "...enjoyable recreational activities that encourage healthy lifestyles"
- b. Supports a category identified as a priority by the public through the Vision2030 survey (see circle pages 29-30)

2. Financial/commercial viability

- a. All development and ongoing maintenance costs will be borne by the applicant
- b. Demand for the applicant's programs continues to grow and is constrained only by the lack of available and appropriate space at the KSAC
- c. The applicant has the capacity to pay market rate rent

3. <u>Development impacts</u>

- a. No significant development impacts were identified by staff
- b. Minimal renovation is proposed and there will be no change to the footprint of the structure
- c. Architectural drawings detailing the proposed improvements have been reviewed and approved by Park Development staff (see circle pages 27-28)

4. Community benefit

a. Satisfies community demand for enhanced, expanded and/or improved indoor aquatic centers, which were rated as the number two priority in the Vision2030 public survey (see circle page 30)

b. Improves the quality of the County's dive programs through enhanced training and resolves space constraints at the KSAC

5. Professional qualifications

- a. Applicant was contracted by the County's Recreation Department in 2010 to provide programming for all of the County's springboard and platform diving programs. Within the first year, revenue was up 100%.
- b. Doug Beavers, Program Director for the MDC, has experience with the creation of dryland diving facilities in Virginia and Missouri, and has contracted a local architectural firm to prepare the drawings submitted to Montgomery Parks for review and approval.

CONSIDERATIONS

During our internal review, Park staff identified several areas of concern that needed to be addressed before a final recommendation to approve could be made to the Planning Board. These included:

- Traffic/parking impacts
- White Flint sector plan impacts
- Code and permit requirements
- Lease terms
- Community use and outreach

Each of these issues is outlined and has been addressed as described below.

Traffic/Parking Impacts

According to our transportation planners, the Adequate Public Facilities (APF) test is applied for new developments generating vehicular trips during the weekday morning peak period (6:30 to 9:30 a.m.) and the evening peak period (4:00 to 7:00 p.m.). The applicant has provided program schedules showing that the programs already offered at the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center will continue to be offered during their current time slots at the new facility and any new programming will be scheduled to avoid those peak times. No new programs will be introduced during the morning or evening peak periods.

White Flint Sector Plan Impacts

The White Flint sector plan was approved by the County Council in March 2010. Negotiations involving various land-use scenarios consistent with the approved plan are underway. This process will likely affect Wall Park. Accordingly, the proposed use is anticipated to be of a temporary nature and only a short-term lease will be considered. The applicant has been advised of and accepted this condition. The applicant has already had preliminary discussions with the County's Department of Recreation about incorporating a dryland diving training

facility into the program of requirements for the expanded Community and Aquatics Center being explored as an option at that site.

Code and Permit Requirements

The applicant will be required to conduct an assessment to determine the structural integrity and condition of the structure and make sure the building is up-to-code, meeting all life safety and ADA requirements. In addition, it will be the applicant's responsibility to apply for, obtain and pay for the relevant permits for the project, including a Use and Occupancy permit and a Park Construction permit. All proposed renovation work will be reviewed and approved by Park Development staff before any work begins. In May 2012, Park staff met with the applicant onsite at Wall Park to review the proposed plan and provide input. The applicant was then asked to submit architectural drawings showing the proposed renovations. These drawings were submitted in June 2012 and have been approved by Park Development staff (see circle pages 27-28). The applicant will be required to obtain all necessary permits before a Park Construction Permit will be issued.

Lease Terms

As described above, active planning for the redevelopment of Wall Park is underway as part of the White Flint Sector Plan process. As a result, the use of this facility will be considered temporary, and the length of the resulting license agreement will be established with consideration given to the anticipated redevelopment dates. The license agreement will require the applicant to pay fair market rent and a Common Area Maintenance (CAM) fee for their use of the building. The actual amount will be negotiated pending approval of the proposed project by the Planning Board.

Community Use and Outreach

Notice signs were posted on the handball court facility in May 2012 to notify current users of the proposed public-private partnership project and provide them an opportunity to comment (see circle page 31). Emails and phone calls were received from nine members of the public in opposition to the proposed project, citing their regular use of the handball courts for racquetball. Copies of the emails received are attached to this memo (see circle pages 32-40 and 43). In response, a public meeting was held at 7:30pm on June 18, 2012, in the meeting room at the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center. An email invitation was sent to all those who had contacted us prior to the meeting date (see circle page 41), and they were encouraged to spread the word among the racquetball community and invite anyone else who might be interested in retaining racquetball as a function at Wall Park.

Staff from Montgomery Parks and the County's Recreation Department hosted the meeting. Three members of the public attended (see circle page 42) and expressed their desire to keep the courts available for racquetball. In response to questions posed by the attendees, staff made the following points:

→ A tax-funded capital investment to improve the handball courts for racquetball play would not be considered while the park is under active planning for redevelopment.

- → In considering the two competing uses racquetball and the MDC aquatic programs
 priority is being given to the use with greater demonstrated demand.
- → Aquatic Center staff, Park Police and Park management have reported that the existing handball courts are currently underutilized, which has resulted in frequent vagrancy and vandalism in this unstaffed building. Park Police and operational staff are in favor of introducing a more active use to mitigate these issues.
- → The racquetball community was encouraged to demonstrate public support for the long-term inclusion of racquetball in the expanded Community/Aquatic Center at Wall Park through the redevelopment process. The appropriate contact information was provided via email following the meeting (see circle page 44).
- → As alternative options in the short term, the Sport & Health Club in Bethesda does have racquetball courts available to non-members for \$20/hour, and Montgomery Parks will be making minor improvements to the public handball courts at Olney Manor Park (which are also used for racquetball) to address the needs expressed by some Wall Park users.

PROPOSED TIMING AND DESIGN

The applicant is proposing a phased approach to the improvements:

- Phase I: This phase would occur within a few days following the execution of the license agreement and would consist primarily of locating mobile equipment within the existing structure to accommodate current programs. The applicant hopes to complete this phase prior to July 12, 2012, as the USA Olympic Diving Team has indicated an interest in utilizing this facility for dryland diving training immediately prior to their departure for the 2012 Olympic Games in London.
- Phase II: This phase would occur during July and August 2012 (assuming all necessary permits have been obtained) and would involve removing most or the entire interior non-load bearing wall that now separates the two handball courts. Two architectural drawings are included in this packet (see circle pages 27-28), one showing partial removal of the wall and the other full removal of the wall; both options have been approved by Park Development staff. The final decision will be made by the applicant based on cost. The exterior footprint of the building will remain untouched.

The applicant will be making a full presentation with more detail to the Planning Board on the improvements proposed in both phases.

COSTS AND OPERATING BUDGET IMPACT

All costs of this project will be covered by the applicant, and a rent in keeping with that charged for other similar facilities will be negotiated should this project be approved by the Planning Board. There is no operating budget impact anticipated, though vagrancy and vandalism are both expected to decrease once the building is more actively used, reducing time spent by both Park Police and the Park Manager patrolling and monitoring the property and removing graffiti.

CONCLUSION

Staff recognizes that approval of this project will displace one user group in favor of another. While that makes this a more difficult decision, it does not change our recommendation to approve the public-private partnership project as proposed by the MDC. There is a current need and significantly greater population served through the aquatic programs offered by the MDC at KSAC. The Vision2030 data clearly shows demonstrated public demand for added, expanded, and/or improved indoor aquatic centers, whereas racquetball was not mentioned. There are six public handball courts in Olney Manor Park that are available for racquetball use. Two of these will be improved by Montgomery Parks to provide a smooth playing surface on the back wall as requested by the Wall Park users. Staff has encouraged the existing racquetball players who utilize the Wall Park courts to demonstrate the public demand for this sport and advocate for the long-term inclusion of racquetball courts as an amenity in the redeveloped Wall Park.

Summary Description of Proposed Project (please type or print clearly):
Built by Beavers (DBA Montgomery Dive Club) is currently contracted by the Montgomery County Recreation Department to manage all county springboard and platform diving programs. These diving programs are nationally recognized for excellence, but have been hamstrung in the past by a lack of dryland training facilities. The top divers in the world spend 50% or more of their training time in a gymnasium setting. We believe that the racquetball courts at wall park represent a perfect opportunity to create such a dryland training site. In addition, the creation of this site would allow for: considerable program growth, creation of new programs, hosting of special events, creation of educational opportunities for the local acrobatics community, and alleviate deck space issues at the adjacent Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center (see Attachment E). In cooperation with the MCRD we intend to turn this facility into a hub of activity for a broad spectrum of county residents. Our plan is to offer senior citizen health and wellness classes, special needs physical education, strength training for adults and children, and staffed special event use. All of this activity is above and beyond our effort to serve the local diving community. We see this project as a proof of concept as we look toward expanded acrobatics facilities in conjunction with the White Flint Sector
Plan construction of an indoor recreation center on this site.
Recently we were contacted by the USA Diving High Performance Director, Steve Foley. He has asked if Montgomery County would be able to host the USA Diving Olympic Team immediately prior to their departure for the 2012 Games in London in mid July 2012. This event will be considerably enhanced by the team identifying dryland training facilities to use during their stay. We see an amazing opportunity to promote this newly created partnership by hosting this event. To do so, we would need to begin installation of equipment 2-3 months prior to the event, which is scheduled for July 12-15, 2012.
Our hope in submitting this application is that the M-NCPPC will allow MCRD and Built by Beavers to take over responsibility for the racquetball courts at Wall Park. MCRD and Built by Beavers will then coordinate to retrofit the facility for its new purpose, accepting responsibility for any associated expenses.

- I. ALIGNMENT WITH PARK PRIORITIES

 - The M-NCPPC Montgomery Parks mission: This project is clearly aligned with the M-NCPPC Montgomery Parks mission, specifically the intent to "offer a variety of enjoyable recreational activities that encourage healthy lifestyles." Our organization teaches people of all ages the value of exercise and physical fitness from an early age, and encourages divers to engage in the sport as a life-long activity. Our participants range in age from 5 75 years old.
 - The Park master plan for your preferred park location We understand that, as outlined in the White Flint Sector Plan, the MCRD intends to expand in the immediate area, building a larger more comprehensive indoor recreation facility very near or even on the site of the Wall Park racquetball courts. We have had preliminary discussions with MCRD and have communicated our strong desire to conduct dry land training and acrobatics activities in this new facility. We see our use of the racquetball courts as an opportunity to demonstrate the value of the acrobatic programs we propose and as an opportunity to develop audiences for expanded indoor recreation facilities at this location in the future. We understand that the racquetball courts are a temporary site for use until the new facility is opened under the White Flint Sector Plan.
 - The parks and recreation needs of Montgomery County identified through the Parks, Recreation and Open Space (PROS) Plan and by the lowest Levels of Service (LOS) in the Vision2030 study. According to the 2005 PROS Plan and the Vision 2030 Study, the county submitted aquatic centers as one of its higher projected needs to the state. Our project will expand the capacity of the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center (formerly Montgomery Aquatic Center), considerably increasing the number of participants in the diving program, and expanding the number of programs offered at the facility. The 2005 PROS Plan also identifies extreme sports as an area of consideration for expanded facilities. Our project would be well-suited to offer instruction in extreme sports such as trampoline and parkour.



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The Vision 2030 Strategic Plan identifies indoor recreation facilities as a gap in level of service. As stated in 2) above, our organization intends to be a part of this project.

 - Market research supporting the need/demand for the proposed project/services: Montgomery County and the National Capitol Area combine to form one of the largest developmental diving communities in the world. There are thousands of participants in the Montgomery County Diving League, the Central Maryland Diving League, the Country Club Swimming and Diving Association and the Northern Virginia Swim League's Diving Division. Many of these kids are looking for opportunities to grow in the sport during the school year. Our organization attempts to



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satisfy the demand for diving instruction, but, particularly in the region around Wall Park, there is more demand than there are available facilities. This project would be one step toward meeting that demand.




Attachment B: Facility Location and Footprint





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



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






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Attachment D: Construction Timeline


The timeline below illustrates the sequence of key events in preparation for opening the acrobatic gym at Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center. We have factored in additional time to each of the steps in order to allow for a certain margin of error.





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Attachment E: Current Trampoline Location at Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center




We use trampoline with overhead spotting harness as a critical component of the training process for divers at all levels. At the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center the only viable location for year-round use of trampoline is less than ideal. In its current location the trampoline restricts but does not block access to the pump room and one of the facility exits. The trampoline's proximity to the diving board stand creates an additional hazard.

Deck space is a limited resource at any aquatic facility, and at KSAC it is particularly scarce. Moving the trampoline and other equipment into the racquetball courts at Wall Park will free significant space on the pool deck and improve safety for participants.






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Attachment G - Profile, Experience, and Qualifications of the Proposer

"Built by Beavers (DBA Montgomery Dive Club)" is the legal name for Montgomery Dive Club (MDC). MDC is contracted by the Montgomery County Recreation Department (MCRD) to provide programming for all of the County's springboard and platform diving programs. This programming includes classes designed for participants from absolute beginners through international competitors. MDC has a long history of competitive excellence, producing hundreds of National Qualifiers, countless National Finalists and Champions, and even a few Olympic Trials Qualifiers.



Note that winter, spring and summer 2012 revenues above are projected.

In September 2010, Built by Beavers took over operation of the MCRD Diving Programs. By the Fall of 2011, diving program revenue had increased 100% over the same time period in 2007. This increase is directly attributable to changes implemented by Built by Beavers LLC. Year over year revenue is illustrated in the graph below, including data from the first and second quarter of 2011.

This growth was accomplished through the creation and execution of a comprehensive marketing and strategic plan implemented by the staff of Built by Beavers/Montgomery Dive Club. We know that there is a market for continued growth, and we see the dry land center at Wall Park as an integral component of that growth.

In just over a year, Montgomery Dive Club has established a sound reputation for excellent customer service, attention to detail, and quality of instruction. Our team has implemented financial processes to ensure that the organization is fiscally prepared to take advantage of growth opportunities such as this dry land center and the expansion we expect to see with the White Flint Sector Plan implementation.

Montgomery Dive Club is led by three nationally respected professional diving coaches. Doug Beavers serves as the MDC Program Director, overseeing the Contract Management, Business Administration and Business Development in addition to his daily coaching duties. Jeff Stabile is MDC's Director of Competitive Diving and an MDC National Team Coach. In his role as Technology Coordinator, Coach Ketrick ensures that we implement appropriate technologies to manage competitions and facilitate high quality instruction.

Doug Beavers has been managing health and fitness programs for over twenty years, with a strong focus on acrobatic sports such as trampoline and competitive diving. He has also participated in Senior Health and Wellness Research, and has five years of corporate experience as a Business Development Consultant. As an assistant for Northern Virginia Dive Club, Beavers played a critical role in the project to build Virginia's first indoor platforms at the Oak Marr Recreation Center in Oakton, Virginia. He also played a key role in marketing and coordinating the 1992 "DIVE" Exhibition at Oak Marr Recreation Center, which featured three members of the 1992 US Olympic Diving Team.



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Coach Beavers later worked at the University of South Carolina as Head Age-Group Coach and Assistant to the University Diving Coach, growing the existing Junior Olympic Team by over 150% in two years. During that time he worked with US Olympians Melisa Moses and Michelle Davidson, as well as Puerto Rican Olympian Vivian Alberty.

In 1996, Beavers was asked to serve as the first Director of Diving Programs for the City of St. Peters, Missouri. In this role, he designed and built a full spectrum of programming for diving and trampoline instruction in cooperation with city administration. In his first year he oversaw the installation of dryland diving equipment at the facility, designed and staffed programs to utilize the equipment, and grew the team to over 75 participants.

In his second year Beavers initiated a \$100,000 project to renovate the diving well at St. Peters, bringing the facility into contention for world-class diving competition. Shortly after the project's completion, the St.Peter's REC-PLEX hosted the USA Diving West National Championships.

The program quickly became a nationally recognized USA Diving Club, capturing a USA Diving West National Championship in 2001. Beavers played a significant role in capturing and hosting the 2004 US Olympic Trials for Diving in the City of St. Peters, Missouri.

In September 2010, Doug founded Built by Beavers LLC, and was named Diving Program Director for Montgomery County Recreation Department. Jeff started coaching professionally in 1990. At the collegiate level, he has produced 16 Conference Champions, eight NCAA Zone Qualifiers, five NCAA qualifiers, and 2 NCAA All-Americans at Occidental College and UC Santa Barbara.

On the club level, Jeff has developed many national-level divers, including 30 Junior National finalists and 10 Senior National qualifiers in 1996-1998. He was named Zone D Age Group Coach of the Year in 1993, serving as Southern Pacific Association President 1997-1999, and being named to the East/West All-Stars International Coaching staff in May 1999.

Over the past five seasons, Jeff has coached over 35 divers to more than 70 Aloha State Games medals, three divers to 25 top-twelve finishes at U.S. Diving Junior Regional Championships, one diver to five appearances at various East/West Championships, three divers to the finals of the AAU National Championships, and one diver to the finals of the US Junior and Senior Nationals.







(Scale: 1 = "Not at all Important" / 5 = "Very Important")






FIGURE 22 IMPORTANCE OF ADDING, EXPANDING, OR IMPROVING FACILITIES (TOP 3 PRIORITIES)

I recently noticed a sign posted at the Shriver Park racquetball courts of a possible use of the site for diving training. I am a regular user of the courts (and have been for many years) and strongly object to their alteration. While I am certain that a diving facility would have greater use, I suspect that the racquetball courts have more users that may be evident. (I only noticed the sign in the last week and have spoken to others at the courts who had not seen the it--it's above the normal field-of-view and readily taken as the existing sign. The point is that any response to the posting is likely to miss many of the court's patrons.) In any event:

- The racquetball courts are an existing, <u>used</u>, and (evidently) low-maintenance facility
- The only other County courts I'm aware of, at Olney Manor Park, are far inferior--e.g., with chain-link gate in rear wall!
- Ample space exists at Shriver Park to accommodate a diving facility in addition to the existing courts
- Destroying an existing low-operating-cost use in favor of a presumably high-cost use is questionable priority in a time of budget constraints

I regret that I will be out of town for the next several weeks and will not have an opportunity to discuss this with you. I hope that you reconsider this proposal and reject it. Thanks.

Ms Stookey -- A sign posted some time in May 2012 at the Wall Park racquetball court structure invites comments on a recent public/private partnership proposal that would repurpose usage of this structure from racquetball to a dryland diving training facility supporting the extensive springboard and platform diving facilities in the adjacent Shriver Aquatic Center building at Wall Park.

I have enjoyed playing racquetball at the Wall Park courts on a regular basis, year around, for many years.

A Google search on "dry diving practice facility" produced useful relevant website references to www.gatorzone.com/ which describe the equipment and facilities involved. A second search using keywords "dryland diving training facility" was more efficient.

From these brief searches, a dryland diving training facility involves trampolines, springboards, padded landing pits and harnesses connected to overhead cables to suspend the trainee athletes under supervision of experienced spotters. It apparently is quite similar to a training facility for gymnasts. The purpose of dryland diving training is to minimize the number of actual wet dives, which involve a number of minor injuries and ailments as well as, occasionally, some more serious injuries which can occur due to poor diving technique.

The Wall Park racquetball building consists of two relatively large courts with overhead lights. It is a masonry structure. There are ventilation grilles at floor level adjacent to the entry doors, with additional air circulation vents in the roof. Otherwise, there is no climate control. In the middle of winter the courts are meatlocker cold, and by August they have become suffocatingly hot and humid.

Much better that a dryland diving training facility should be constructed as an addition to the large Shriver Aquatic Center building at Wall Park, where it can share the climate control already in place. If the racquetball building were to be repurposed, it would require installation of a standalone heating, ventilation and air conditioning system which probably would make the overall cost of the conversion prohibitively expensive.

The fact that you are soliciting an early round of comments from players using the Wall Park racquetball courts suggests that you might also want to determine how many people are using this facility in its current form. One way you could do this with more accuracy and over a longer period of time would be to replace the free windup timer switches for the overhead lights with coin-activated timer switches, like those that have been in place for many years at the six small County racquetball courts at Olney Manor Recreational Park. Charge some nominal rate like 25 cents for 15 minutes, so a typical two-hour session costs two dollars. No worse than a suburban parking meter. Collect the quarters once a week, once a month, whatever. Then you get a more accurate picture of court usage -- John F Waters, 7019 Poplar Ave, Takoma Park, MD 20912-4675

Kate,

I'm sorry I wasn't able to attend the meeting yesterday evening. I spoke to my friend Duston Barton, who was at the meeting, and understand that a decision on the future of the racquetball courts will be made in the next few weeks. I want to again express my hope that the courts can be saved. Duston and I play at least once a week at Wall Park with a group of half dozen other players. We are not aware of any comparable public courts in the area, and if the courts are torn down or repurposed we won't have anywhere we can play racquetball.

We have tried to play at the courts in Olney but most of the lights didn't work and the chain link doors prematurely ended many of our rallies and made playing matches difficult. The courts at Wall Park are better and much more convenient for our group, but if they cannot be saved, please consider fixing the Olney courts so the lights work and don't require quarters and the courts are fully enclosed. I believe there are many people, like me, who enjoy playing racquetball, and I hope the County will make providing racquetball courts a priority as it makes decisions about the future of Wall Park.

Dear Supporters of Racquetball at Wall Park,

Many thanks to those of you who joined us for the public meeting on Monday, June 18, at the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center. Your attendance and the resulting discussion was greatly appreciated.

The proposed Wall Park Dryland Diving Training Facility public-private partnership project, submitted by the Montgomery Dive Club (MDC), the organization that offers diving and aquatics programs for county youth at the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center on behalf of the County's Department of Recreation, will be presented to the Planning Board next Thursday, June 28, for their consideration. That presentation is currently scheduled to take place at 11:30am. I have prepared the staff packet, and it does recommend approval of the proposed partnership for the reasons we discussed at our meeting on Monday night. For those of you who were unable to attend, a summary of the proposed project as well as an overview of the public meeting discussion is contained in the staff packet (link provided below). The staff packet also includes all of your emails in support of retaining the courts for racquetball use.
