This is a bad idea and we vehemently oppose it for the following reasons:

1. It is to be build on what are now public parklands which will be leased by Montgomery Lane at what appear to be extremely favorable rates. We did not realize that parks could be converted to commercial uses. There is not a lot of down-county park area and there is not going to be any more. Converting any of what we have to commercial property is just a bad idea.

2. It is being built near a built-up residential area and will obstruct views, reduce recreational options (many

people now walk in the area), and, if the business is successful, result in congestion.

3. There are numerous areas in Montgomery County where such a facility could be built without interfering with

the neighbourhood in which it is being built.

4. We have been led to believe that the lease arrangements are front-loaded in favor of the developing corporation to a degree such that it may be wise to walk away from the property after 10 years or so. Despite the apparant good intentions of the present development team one is left with the fact that this is a risky long-term commercial venture in the middle of park property. As we understand it the Germantown indoor soccer facilities, in many ways a similar venture, have failed commercially.

In summary, there is no reason to take a beautiful piece of downcounty public land and turn it into a private commercial venture. We are amazed that the idea was even broached publicly and will be astonished if the PPC approves it.

Secondly, the impact of drainage into the natural streams in that area will be devastating. We are writing to you in relation to the proposed Cabin John Sportsplex which is under consideration of the Commission you chair. As Montgomery County residents for several decades and property owners at Chelsea Towers for two decades, we want to

register our firm opposition to the proposed facility.

It will destroy the view we enjoy from our apartment by replacing the beautiful trees of Cabin John Park with a huge building that is a real eyesore. 

I am writing to protest the proposed construction of an indoor baseball facility in Cabin John Park. I urge you to oppose this plan.

As a neighbor of the Park who walks daily among the forest paths, I have already seen too much development of wild and open space in the form of the elaborate (and under-utilized) Shirley Povich ballfield, the expanded Ice Rink and adjacent parking areas. I am very worried about further encroachment on public parkland by private commercial enterprises. I am also opposed to taxpayer money being used to underwrite a dubious enterprise that will only benefit its builders.

I find the "need" for indoor baseball laughable. When I was growing up, every sport had a season. Some of the enjoyment involved looking forward to the transition from winter sports to warm weather, outdoor sports. As an adult, who happens to be a professional sports psychologist, I think that children are becoming tracked into serious, year-round devotion to only one sport at too young an age. This inhibits their development into well-rounded athletes who can enjoy many different sports without pressures to specialize at a time when they are too young to choose wisely. I see many teenage athletes who are already "burned-out" from too much time spent playing one sport.

In addition, since I live within shouting distance of the proposed facility, I am concerned about the consequences to my quality of life from the lights, noise and traffic that this would bring to my neighborhood during the construction phase and then ongoing use. I am also worried about a decline in my property value. Most people rent or buy in this area precisely because they enjoy and appreciate the natural, quiet surroundings provided by the wooded park.

I hope you will consider these points and choose to oppose the construction of the indoor baseball facility in Cabin John Park.

This is a bad idea and we vehemently oppose it for the following reasons:

1. It is to be build on what are now public parklands which will be leased by Montgomery Lane at what appear to be extremely favorable rates. We did not realize that parks could be converted to commercial uses. There is not a lot of down-county park area and there is not going to be any more. Converting any of what we have to commercial property is just a bad idea.

2. It is being built near a built-up residential area and will obstruct views, reduce recreational options (many

people now walk in the area), and, if the business is successful, result in congestion.

3. There are numerous areas in Montgomery County where such a facility could be built without interfering with

the neighbourhood in which it is being built.

4. We have been led to believe that the lease arrangements are front-loaded in favor of the developing corporation to a degree such that it may be wise to walk away from the property after 10 years or so. Despite the apparant good intentions of the present development team one is left with the fact that this is a risky long-term commercial venture in the middle of park property. As we understand it the Germantown indoor soccer facilities, in many ways a similar venture, have failed commercially.

In summary, there is no reason to take a beautiful piece of downcounty public land and turn it into a private commercial venture. We are amazed that the idea was even broached publicly and will be astonished if the PPC approves it.

As a resident of the neighborhood within which the Cabin John Sportsplex is proposed to be located, I have reservations about its positive impact on the surrounding environs. This complex will increase the traffic in an already congested area. Currently, the proposed Cabin John Park location has outdoor baseball fields, including the Shirley Povich field, tennis courts, a volley ball court, two handball courts, a new indoor ice skating facility, picnic areas, and a small amphitheatre. There are also a variety of wooded walking trails of various lengths. The addition of another facility of the proposed size will create a noticeable influx of traffic and will exacerbate the already tight parking situation when the facilities offered at Cabin John Park are in use.

The park is a quiet respite from the Westfield Mall, the industrial park and the busy Ride On and Metro bus facility located nearby. Cabin John Park is one of the few green spaces left in the downcounty sector of Montgomery County. The residents in the high and low rise condominiums, the low cost Magruder complex, the townhouses, Scotland, Inverness, and others who drive to the park, use the ball fields, walk the trails, and use the grassy areas for family activities, such as picnics, pet exercise and training, and soccer games.

We are currently in a "tight money" situation within which many agencies face the possibility of not being able to provide promised services due to potential lack of funds. Park and Planning issued a "Request for Proposals" (RFP) for an indoor baseball facility in 2001 even though the facility is not a part of the park's six-year Capital Improvement Plan and when the U.S. Government had a \$127.3 billion dollar surplus. According to the Washington Post (Tuesday, July 15, 2003 front page article "Budget" Deficit may surpass \$450 Billion") the U.S. Government deficit may exceed \$450 billion in 2003. Now there is the consideration of a proposal of the one respondent to the RFP, Montgomery Lane, whose primary tenant is Bethesda-Chevy Chase Baseball, Inc., a private non-profit corporation. The forty year lease proposal for the approximately one acre of parkland would give the park approximately \$ 2 million, or about \$4167 monthly. This revenue source does not seem to be a fiscally responsible one in these times.

In addition, given the current economic scenario, what happens if the developer has financial problems? Who finishes building the facility? Who takes over the financial responsibilites? If the project is abandoned, who assumes responsiblity for the building site and at what cost? Who pays for the restoration of the site into parkland? Instead of a revenue source, the facility has become an expense. Further, if there is truly a substantial need for this type of facility, has there been an effort to see if there is a park facility in another location which could be "refitted" to provide the same services as the proposed one? Perhaps research into this aspect of the issue would provide the needed services at a reasonable cost.

We like baseball but...The Gazette has reported on a proposal for a \$1.8 million indoor baseball training facility to be built within Cabin John Park. The idea is that private developers will build it on parkland with a 20 to 40-year contract to run it. Looking at the County's experience with the Soccerplex and the Black Rock Arts Center, some adult supervision is in order here. Both were built with the promise that they would be self-supporting with no need of any help from the County. Not so. Within a short time to support the Soccerplex, roads needed to widened, lanes added, sewer lines extended etc., at County expense. Meanwhile, finances at the Soccerplex are still. They have had to find various commercial ventures to raise money to stay afloat, and have become a burden to the County. In May, the County decided to spend over \$4 million to acquire the Black Rock Arts Center because promised public donations for the ownership and operation of the Center failed to materialize.

Now, it seems, we are going to do it again. Word has it that the Park & Planning Commission and a few County Council members support the proposed indoor baseball facility "because they like baseball" and because the baseball lobby is well connected. Is this how public policy is made and taxpayer money is spent in Montgomery County? We like baseball too, and enjoy the games in the area. However, if this idea is really economical, why does it need the subsidy of free public land, especially when open green space is so rare in that part of the County? If it fails, who foots the bill?

Dear Council Members,

I am writing regarding the proposed indoor baseball training facility at Cabin John Park. Why, in such a densely populated area, would the County even consider tearing up more green space? It would seem that the baseball interests involved have other options. Olney, less densely populated, has two potential sites and there is less controversy about building it there. Another option, if the project must be in this end of the County, would be to use the old skating facility at Wheaton Regional Park. No new green space would be dug up, the park already has several excellent baseball fields, and the road/sewer infrastructure should still exist.

Wheaton Regional holds a cautionary tale for policy makers and supporters of small business. Before that rink was built circa 1970, skaters in that part of the County used the Howard Johnson Rink near Wheaton Plaza. When the Wheaton Regional rink went up, the Howard Johnson rink was out of business. The County now has a three privately run indoor baseball training facilities. Construction, on public land, of this facility will kill those small businesses. Is it really good policy to bankrupt tax-paying businesses by subsidizing their competition? Have Park & Planning and the County Council considered the policy and fiscal implications of this project?

If indeed the facility is a good idea, it should be done privately. An option worth exploring by both the County and the developers is EPA financial help in re-developing brown-fields for new businesses. Both Rockville Pike and Gude Drive have several potential sites whose redevelopment would benefit all involved.


