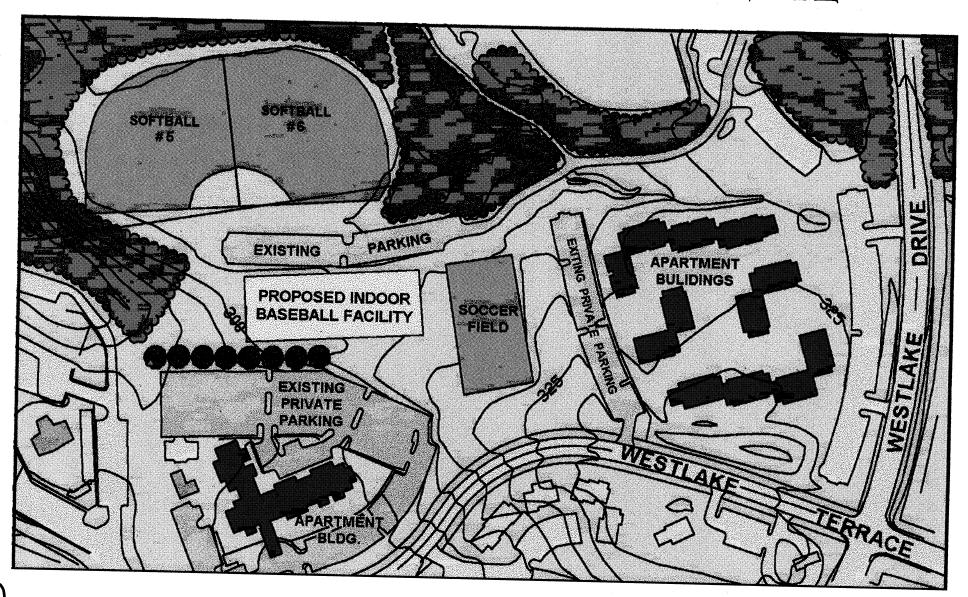
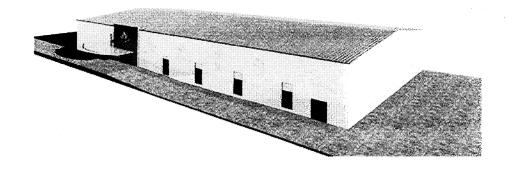
# Proposed Cabin John Regional Park INDOOR BASEBALL FACILITY SITE

### **CORPORATE CAPABILITY**

Montgomery Lane, LLC was formed as a limited liability company in the State of Maryland in 2001. The members of the company and their ownership interests are:

Mimi Brodsky Kress	33.3% ownership
Philip Leibovitz	33.3% ownership
Richard Mandell	33.3% ownership

Montgomery Lane, LLC, is a separate entity with the same owners as Sandy Spring Builders, LLC, a well-respected custom homebuilder in Montgomery County. They would be responsible for the financing, development, and construction of the building structure. They would own the building, and oversee the property management. The principals have been involved in residential and commercial building for the past 20 years. In addition to the high-end custom homes that they build together, each of the partners has experience outside of the residential field.

Phil Leibovitz was the construction manager overseeing all aspects of development and construction of the Shirley Povich Field from start of construction through delivery of the completed ball field for the opening game. This work was done on a pro-bono basis, and Mr. Leibovitz was given an award for his efforts, by the Montgomery County Parks Foundation, Inc. He continues to help with maintenance of the facilities, and is familiar with many employees of the Parks Department. He also oversaw the construction of a similar building at the Garden of Remembrance Cemetery in Clarksburg, Maryland in 2000/01.

Over the past 20 years, Mimi Brodsky Kress has been a general partner in the construction and property management of over 300,000 square feet of industrial buildings in Montgomery and Frederick Counties, as well as a 4-story office building in Prince Georges County. She continues to be involved in the management of those properties (Airpark Road Industrial Center, Cessna Avenue Industrial Park, and Piper Industrial Center in the Montgomery County Airpark; Derwood Business Center in Rockville; Industry Lane Business Center in Frederick; Cherry Lane Office Park in Laurel). She has been an active leader in the Maryland-National Capital Building Industry Association for the past 20 years, and currently serves on the Board of Directors for their Development Guaranty Group of Montgomery County, MD.

Richard Mandell has been involved in the ownership and management of several large apartment complexes in both Maryland and Pennsylvania for the past 15 years. He has been active in the formation and continued presence of the Custom Builders Council of the Maryland National Capital Building Industry Association.

#### PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT AND OPERATIONS PLAN

The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission ("M-NCPPC") owns and operates the Cabin John Regional Park ("the Park") in Montgomery County for the benefit of all of the citizens of the Maryland-National Capital District. The Park is located approximately 12 miles northwest of Washington, D.C., adjacent to Interstate Route 270 on the west and bounded by Tuckerman lane, Westlake Drive, Seven Locks Road, and Democracy Boulevard. The Park consists of and Athletic Area that include Shirley Povich Field (a lighted baseball field and clubhouse), five softball fields (three of which are lighted), four lighted tennis courts, and one volleyball court. The Athletic Area includes public restrooms, play equipment, and hiking trails. The park further includes six indoor tennis courts and two indoor skating rinks.

Montgomery Lane, LLC intends to build the proposed Indoor Baseball/Softball Training Facility consistent with the footprint as shown on the site plan. All necessary permits from Montgomery County and M-NCPPC would be applied for by Montgomery Lane, LLC. The site would be cleared as required, and a pre-fabricated metal building of approximately 20,000 entrance square feet would be constructed. The exterior front of the building would be predominantly made of brick or decorative block. Montgomery Lane, LLC would provide utilities to the site – sewer is existing on-site, and water will be brought from the rear of the existing Westlake Drive facilities where a 13 inch water line exists (per Dewberry & Davis Engineers). Easements for the utilities may be required from M-NCPPC. There will be no additional parking provided, as the existing parking at the site should be adequate. Other than at the front entrance, the Parks Department will be responsible for all landscaping at the site, and for all future maintenance of the landscaping. The building will be designed to provide adequate facilities as detailed in the specifications. Montgomery Lane, LLC will provide all necessary liability and other insurance as required.

Montgomery Lane, LLC will receive a 40-year land lease from Montgomery County/M-NCPPC for Site #1 at Cabin John Regional Park. Approval will be required from the Montgomery County Council for the lease period. They will pay a rental fee to M-NCPPC as detailed in the pro-forma analysis. They will also pay real estate taxes on the facility itself. Montgomery Lane, LLC will provide the financing of approximately \$1,600,000 for the development and construction. B-CC Baseball, Inc., a non-profit organization, will sign a 15-year lease with Montgomery Lane, LLC with future renewal options. Montgomery Lane, LLC will charge an annual rent of \$320,000 to B-CC Baseball, with annual increases. In addition to the rental payment of be made by Montgomery Lane to M-NCPPC, B-CC Baseball will pay \$2,500 annually to M-NCPPC. At the end of the 40 years, the facility will be donated by Montgomery Lane, LLC to Montgomery County/M-NCPPC.

## SPECIFICATIONS FOR INTERIOR OF TRAINING FACILITY

- Five (5) high quality, coin-operated Batting Cages, at least three (3) of which would remain open to the public on a walk-in basis at all times. Three (3) cages will throw slow hardball, medium hardball and fast hardball, respectively. The fourth cage will throw medium hardball/slow softball. The fifth cage will throw fast softball/slow softball. Including a public viewing area, the batting cages will occupy approximately 6,900 square feet.
- Multi-use, synthetic surfaced Training Area encompassed by netting. The training area will
  accommodate individual and group lessons, as well as for team rental. It can be used to
  conduct infield drills for many sports, as well as accommodate various exercise programs.
- Equipment Storage Area, Janitorial Closets, and Utility Closets.
- Two public restrooms with showers and lockers.
- Mezzanine Space for two offices, Conference/Party Room, and Observation Deck.

#### **B-CC** Baseball, Inc.

Bethesda-Chevy Chase Baseball was founded in 1993 to provide all children (age 6-18) an opportunity to participate in an organized program that encourages teamwork and sportsmanship while developing baseball skills. They provide full and partial scholarship opportunities. Their mission statement advocates, "The development of strong fundamental baseball skills in conjunction with and appreciation for good sportsmanship." They are a non-profit corporation with an active Board of Directors. They will be the primary tenant for the facility, and will use the space for training, clinics, and indoor games.

#### FINANCIAL PLAN AND LEASE PROVISIONS

Montgomery Lane, LLC will finance \$1,481,703 and personally invest \$350,000 to develop and construct the proposed Indoor Baseball/Softball Facility. The principals have access to lines of credit at three local banking institutions. Each of the individual owners of Montgomery Lane, LLC have submitted financial statements and letters attesting to their financial ability to perform. A letter from Resource Bank expressing an interest in providing the financing has been provided.

A separate Pro-Forma analysis was originally prepared by RSM McGaldrey, Inc. (certitied public accountants), upon assumptions and cash flow projections provided by Montgomery Lane, LLC. Those assumptions and projections have been revised by Montgomery Lane based on changes being made to the size and use of the facility.

B-CC Baseball, Inc. will sign a 20 year lease starting at an annual rent of \$340,500.00 with two and a half (2.5%) percent annual increases. Options will be provided for additional renewal terms.

In their Pro-Forma for the indoor facility, B-CC Baseball projects total revenue of approximately \$462,925 for the first year of operation, with limited income projected for the non-peak season. The peak season (November thru March) income is projected at \$269,925. The hourly fees are based on the rentals currently charged by the Germantown Soccerplex and other indoor facilities. The charge per square foot would be slightly higher in Cabin John (16,000 square feet) than in Germantown (20,000 square feet), but the customer base in lower Montgomery County should be able to support the higher fee.

Additional revenue is expected to be generated from the following incomeproducing activities outside of the peak period: girls softball camp (\$30,000); vending machine net income (\$6,000); lunchtime corporate basketball leagues (\$50,000); seniors activities and MCRD activities (\$10,000); birthday parties (\$10,000); and the batting cages are anticipated to produce revenue of approximately \$75,000 minimum.

B-CC Baseball will fund the equipment installation and fit-up from fundraising activities and from other current income sources.



#### **COMMUNITY OUTREACH**

#### **Scholarship Opportunities**

A scholarship fund has been established to provide opportunities for participants requiring financial assistance. There will be a variety of scholarship opportunities provided. The batting cage & pitching machines will be opened to local organizations and schools for free use once a month. Possible use will be for low-income housing youth, children & adults in special needs programs, and other groups recommended by civic associations.

The following organizations have been contacted, and have expressed an interest in using the proposed facility for a substantially reduced rate or for no charge:

#### REGIONAL INSTITUTE FOR CHILDREN & ADOLESCENTS (

This is a level-5 therapeutic MCPS school for emotionally disabled children. They would be interested in using the facility for indoor sports & the batting cages for their residential students one evening per month, and possibly for several hours on a weekend day during the months of April thru October. They would not be charged for use of the facility.

#### JEWISH COUNCIL FOR THE AGING

This non-profit organization provides services for all denominations of seniors in the area. They would be interested in using the facility during weekday hours for either their Senior Net computer classes or their Fitness 55 exercise class. They would not be charged for use of the facility.

#### KEEN FOUNDATION

This non-profit organization provides one-on-one exercise programs for 135 disabled children and young adults (age 5-32). They are currently offering their program on Sundays at Tilden Middle School, and would be interested in exploring opportunities with the proposed facility. They have offered potential sponsorship to cover costs for equipment required for their needs. They would not be charged for use of the facility.



#### MONTGOMERY COUNTY RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Cindy Roeder has expressed in an interest in using the facility at rates similar to what MCRD currently pays for their various indoor programs. Of specific interest to them would be the opportunity to use the space for their Tiny Tots program, seniors activities, and possibly summer golf/tennis camp.

#### CATHOLIC YOUTH ORGANIZATION

This non-profit would be interested in using the facility for their baseball and basketball leagues during the year.

#### WHEATON HIGH SCHOOL & EINSTEIN HIGH SCHOOL

Both of these schools have expressed an interest in using the facility for their baseball teams during the season.

#### MARKET ASSESSMENT

Demographic assessment supports significant usage of the proposed Indoor Baseball/Softball Training Facility:

- The nationwide total of both slow- and fast-pitch baseball players is approximately 20 million (source: Montgomery County Dept. of Recreation). This represents 7.1% of the US population (source: the US population is 281.4 million, based on 1990 US Census data)
- When applied to the Montgomery County population of 873,341, there are a projected 62,000 slow- and fast-pitch baseball players county-wide (source: 1990 Census data)
- Approximately 54% of school-age children (6 to 18 years old) play organized team sports; 60% of boys and 48% of girls play team sports (source: <u>American Demographics</u>, August 2001)
  - Baseball is the most popular team sport played by boys: 46% of boys who play a team sport play baseball – this represents 28% of all school age boys, approximately 23,000 in Montgomery County
  - While specific parallel statistics were not provided for girls, it is assumed that 10% of school-age girls play baseball, approximately 8,000 in Montgomery County

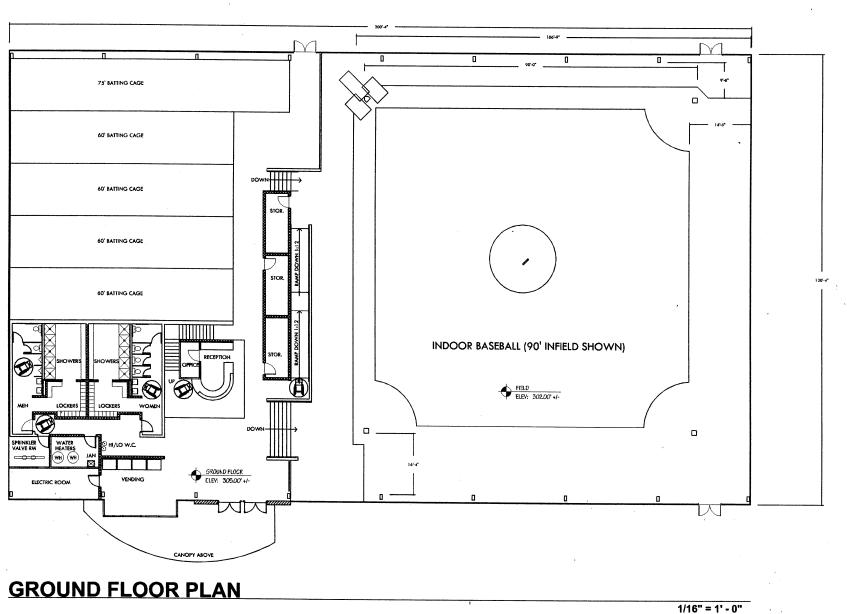

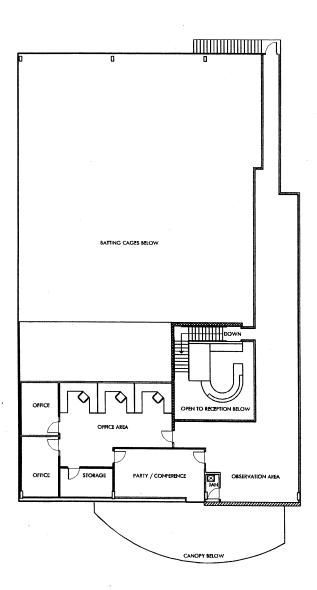

Thank you very much for your time talking with me today. Your sport facility project sounds terrific and is very needed in the Montgomery community.

I would like to take this opportunity to reintroduce the K.E.E.N. Foundation to you. The Kids Enjoy Exercise Now (K.E.E.N.) Foundation, Inc., is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) organization that provides free one-on-one recreational opportunities for children, teenagers and young adults with disabilities. Modeled on an innovative program established in England, K.E.E.N. was launched in the United States in 1992.

With the help of volunteers from Washington D.C., Maryland, and Northern Virginia, K.E.F.N. has served more than 300 children, teens and young adults. These individuals have disabilities such as Seizure Disorders, Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Downs Syndrome, Mental Retardation, Depression, and various Developmental Delays. Unlike other recreation programs for individuals with disabilities, K.E.E.N. provides an open, unstructured environment for people with any type of disability, including those with significant needs. For some of the children and young adults who are unable to participate in other programs, K.E.E.N. may be their only recreational activity.

K.E.E.N. is governed by a voluntary Board of Directors and operates through committees comprised principally of the volunteers and parents of children and young adults with disabilities who take part in K.E.E.N.'s programs. All of K.E.E.N.'s activities are provided at no cost to the children and their families.

For the last ten years K.E.E.N. programs have been operating principally out of the Montgomery County Public School facilities that we lease during available time slots. In an effort to eliminate the long waiting list of young people with disabilities interested in K.E.E.N., we doubled the number of K.E.E.N. sessions in Septemer 2002 and have dramatically increased the number of young people we serve. Our ability to enroll new athletes is limited only by space and time restrictions in our current facility. We have aiready requested additional facility time from the County, and have embarked on a comprehensive facility survey all around the community.

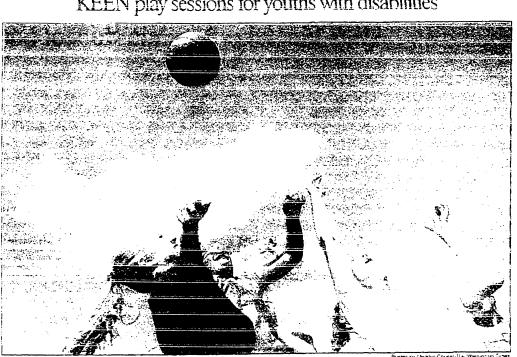

partner in a D.C. law hirm, says KELLAY got its start when the mother of disabled sisters approached him at Oxford's terms coulds and asked him about involving her girls in some hasic play.

"There was no grand plan at all," says Mr.

Portnoy, who played tenms with the guis once a week for about a year. "It was the highlight of my time at Oxford."

He discovered, however, that rennis was not the best sport for those with physical disabilities. He and some friends expanded the con-

cept to include basic aerobics and running exercises, then later paddled along the Thames in scutts monthed for disabled passengers. By the time he left England, the group was serving about 600 children, kerurning to the United States around 1992, he looked for a pro-

gram that operated under a similar system. He found none, so he decided to start a branch of KEEN

The concept, he says, is simplicity\_itself.

The program harnesses volunteers "without preconceived notions of the limits of people with disabilities," he says. Mr. Portnoy himself never enrolled in any special education courses. It turned out his instincts — and simply spending time with disabled children — proved satisfactory.

KEEN athictes suffer from various disabilities, including autism, cerebral palsy and Down syndrome. KEEN sessions, typically held on Sundays, most at Berhesda's Tilden

Middle School, let children and adults with disabilities play games, swim and socialize with their peers. KEEN volunteers are briefed before each session, then paired up with athletes for the afternoon. A tile, or athlete profile, is kept on each disabled person for volunteers to read over before meeting the child. The profiles include personality descriptions, favorite sports, specific skills the parents would like to see

rivities that may frighten the child. The volunteers are a blend of high school students and participants from charitable groups such as D.C. Cares and Single Volunteers of D.C.

"It's taught me a lot about pa-tience and perseverance," says Mr. Portnoy, adding that volunteers echn his reflections. For the more seriously disabled, "it takes a year and half to reach a very basic skill," he

Area parents will need some paience, too, should they want their shild to join the KEEN athletes. Curently, about 50 children are on a vaiting list to join the program.

On a recent Sunday, about 54 new olunteers showed up to run, play atch and scoot around on tiny carts a Tilden's gymnasium. The sounds if speakers squeaking on the gymassium floor combined with the easy cries of laughter filling the arge space. A few parents who pted to stay and watch the pro-eedings fined the outer ring of the ymnasium.

Participating parents applieded to program for the one-on-one pairnes that address each child's speific needs

saw the boy, he says, the child only sniffled once.

"You see a lot of kids go through a progression," he says.

Jay Shotel, professor and chair-

man of the department of teacher preparation and special education at George Washington University, says programs such as KEEN help the parents, too.

"Often times, parents are bur dened as full-time caregivers," Mr. Shotel says. KEEN allows parents a respite from their duties though many opt to watch their chil-

dren at play.
"A child with a disability takes more time, effort and energy than a kid that doesn't have a handleap," he

The program also reinforces lessons begun by parents from a dif-

ferent perspective.
"It gives the child the opportunity to establish another relationship with someone other than their parent," says Mr. Shotel, resulting in more independent and aware children.

Disabled or not, children tend to take advantage of their parents' good will around the home.

They know they'll get away with things in the normal environment, he says. With KEEN, "they need to he on their best behavior. That's premendously valuable.

"We want them in the world at large," he says. "To me, this program is practice for that."

Beata Okulska, the group's exec-

utive director, says the program is free for participating families

"They're already burdened with

so many bills," Ms. Okuiska says.

Volunteers, Ms. Okulska says, gain the "sensitivity to look at the world from a different perspective and to value things they didn't value before. It's a very special relation-

Advantages for the athletes indude a change of scenery, particu larly for those who may lead isplated lives away from their school systems

"This is a place where they can soemize with their peers and not be indeed," she says, "Nobody's afraid of their behavior in some radical or unexplained way. Nobody needs to pretend that they are better, smarter or premer. People can be who they are and don't worry that they will be laughed at."

Mr. Portney hopes the 54 new volunteers come back at some point for future Sunday outings. Even if they do not, he says, an impression has been made.

"Those 54 are now out in the community with a little more sensihillty than those who hadn't been with KEEN," he says.
