Dear Mr. Berlage, Board & Staff:

The Greater Olney Civic Association (GOCA) is strongly opposed to the site chosen for the proposed expansion of the Winchester School.

GOCA opposes the use on the proposed site at Georgia Avenue and the private Rockhill Lane including but not limited to the following problems associated with the site:

- Site use is too intense for its size and close proximity to established single family neighborhoods.
- Site size does not provide enough area for buffering noise, light and visual impact of the proposed structure.
- Site size does not provide enough parking for special events.
- Site coverage with impervious surface area is too great which will adversely affect adjacent property owners with runoff from the property.
- Site location creates potential traffic hazards with buses entering and exiting into rush hour traffic.
- Site location creates potential traffic hazards from buses being unable to enter and exit the property in a single lane swinging wide because of inadequate turn radius and lack of storage accel/decel lane.
- Site location creates potential traffic hazards from vehicles coming to and from the school to make of U-turn's at Hines Road and Cherry Valley Dr.
- Site location creates potential traffic hazards from slow moving vehicles impeding average traffic flows.
- Site use does not provide any incidental benefits to the immediate neighborhood in the form of access to shared resources such as ball field or other open area because of its inadequate size.

I am writing this letter concerning the Petition of Mary Rhim/The Winchester School (Case Number S-2604, OZAH Referral Number 04-44). I am opposed to the proposed Winchester School moving to Georgia Avenue in Olney, Maryland. My husband and I have lived at 17328 Georgia Avenue since 1983. The lot in question, 17320 Georgia Avenue, adjoins the rear of our property.

The noise and floodlights that accompany a school will be extremely disruptive to our way of life. Because the proposed school will be located right next door to us there will be no buffer zone. We are fond of the quiet, peaceful backyard we now enjoy. The trees on the adjoining property are one of the largest and tallest stands of old trees in this area, but also as a shelter for many types of birds and wildlife. The proposed school will destroy this environment. In addition, the size of the property is too small for the scale of an operation they have envisioned. I would like the property at 17320 Georgia Avenue to remain in residential use.

I am concerned with drainage issues as well. When the development on the north side of us was built in the 1980s, the developers assured us that the drainage would be satisfactory. Since then, however, we have had severe drainage problems on our property. It is obvious that the construction of a new building and parking lot on the south side of us is not appealing, given that it could negatively impact the drainage on our property even further.

There are traffic concerns also. We already have to deal with congested (and many times, *stopped*) traffic in the mornings on Georgia Avenue. I have had to wait ten minutes to exit my own driveway. Having a school two doors away will worsen this situation for myself, and for all southbound commuters. This area of Georgia Avenue is dangerous already on weekday afternoons due to the 50 miles-per-hour speed limit. The added hazard of cars and busses turning in and out of the driveway at the proposed school will make the currently bad situation even worse.

### Dear Sirs:

The Cherrywood Homeowners Association (HOA) represents 606 single-family houses and townhomes located in Olney west of Georgia Avenue between Cherry Valley Drive on the south and Hines Road on the north. Recently, we received plans for the proposed Winchester School to be located on Georgia Avenue in Olney on property adjacent to Cherrywood property owners. We have reviewed and discussed the plans with our Board members and solicited comments from adjacent and nearby property owners. Based on the outcome of these discussions, Cherrywood HOA stands opposed to the proposed location of the Winchester School for the following reasons:

- Insufficient space for the proposed school A brief review of the proposed plans indicate that the proposed facility is located on a very small, constrained lot with insufficient space for parking and other activities within the grounds. We believe that this will result in increased traffic and parking on our neighborhood streets from early in the morning until after 6 PM, particularly for special events that will inevitably be held at the school.
- Entrance on Georgia Avenue With 180 students and 23 faculty members for the proposed school, traffic
  on Georgia Avenue in the early morning and possibly the start of the afternoon rush hour will be greatly

impacted by cars turning into and out of the school. This condition is further exacerbated by the lack of an accel/decel lane for the entrance drive. As the current R-200 zoning status represents a maximum of five single-family homes on the 88,000 square-foot site, the impact of this proposed change on Georgia Avenue traffic will be significant. Additionally, many children within our community use the sidewalk in front of the proposed facility. A very similar traffic hazard already exists on Georgia Avenue just south of Old Baltimore Drive for a child daycare facility that does not have nearly as much traffic as the school will have.

- The character of the surrounding area proposed for the school is solely residential in nature The stretch of Georgia Avenue between the Olney CBD located to the north and the old Silo Inn property located to the south is completely residential. We believe that by locating the school at this site, the overall character of our neighborhood will be adversely affected. All existing private and public schools are located in the immediate vicinity of Olney's central business district. The only exceptions to this are public schools built with and embedded into communities that neighborhood children attend primarily utilizing county school buses.
- Noise and lighting impacts from traffic and people within the facilities boundaries will impact the Cherrywood neighborhood The recent addition of the golf park south of Olney has resulted in a tremendous increase in lighting within our neighborhood. The addition of a school at this site has the potential to further increase the impacts of lighting and noise pollution particularly for our HOA neighbors on Blossom View Drive. Of particular concern to us is that the setback from adjacent properties is minimal with no room for landscaping buffers.
- Allowable building height for the site is listed as 50-ft. on the plans Will there be a possibility of future expansion to this height?
- Safety and security are a concern for our neighborhood Of particular concern is the fact that the proposed parking lot is set back and hidden from Georgia Avenue. This would be an ideal site for undesirables to gather. Current County Police presence in Olney is minimal.

# Dear Sirs/Madam:

I am writing to express my opposition to the above-referenced proposal to modify the zoning ordinances and place a 180-student school in a residential neighborhood in Olney. The proposal makes impossible claims that call for military-like precision in traffic and parking to shoehorn an unsuitable project into a residential site.

Parking: The proposal cites 26 spaces and 4 visitors spaces for a day staff of 15 that will depart at 3:00 pm and an evening staff of 12 who will arrive at 3:00 pm. Unless the children are to be left alone during the shift change, the proposal forces one arriving staff member to park in a visitor space and leaves only 2 spaces for other persons, such as parents of the 180 children, who might happen to be at the school at dismissal time. The inevitable contractors, maintenance and cleaning personnel will cause additional parking problems. People will be forced to park on Georgia Avenue.

The claim that 120 of the 180 children will take 3 buses is implausible and random. It is impossible to predict with precision how enrollment might change with a move to the proposed location and how many children will take the bus in a given year. Assuming the implausible best-case figure of 120 bus-riders, 60 children will have to be dropped off and picked up by 60 cars twice per day. In the unlikely event that all 15 of the parking spaces not occupied by regular staff members are empty, 45 parents will not

be able to find parking in the lot twice per day. Any proposal that parents drop off their children without parking also fails, as a drop-off line of at least 60 cars will block traffic on Georgia Avenue.

While one parked car along a street can remove a traffic lane from use, the presence of 45 parked cars along the four-lane, heavily traveled, 50 mile per hour stretch of State Highway 97 (Georgia Avenue) in front of the proposed location will bottleneck southbound traffic on a vital artery.

The situation on rainy days when parents choose to drive children who normally take the bus will be worse. Parent-teacher conference days, student performance days, back to school night, Career Day, Grandparents Day and innumerable other special occasions that crowd the calendar will further overwhelm the parking situation on a regular basis.

The nearest cross street of Cherry Valley Drive is not suitable for high-volume overflow parking due to its narrowness. Existing traffic problems on Cherry Valley Drive were the subject of a recent county traffic study that led to the installation of speed humps.

Safety: The proposed location fronts Georgia Avenue at a point where the southbound highway is two lanes (rather than three) and increasingly heavily traveled as development continues in the up-county region. This road is not conducive to pedestrian traffic, especially that of elementary school-aged children. The location of the proposed school requires that traffic entering and exiting will cross Georgia Avenue without the benefit of a traffic light. As arrival and dismissal times at the proposed location clash with the high-density morning and evening rush hours, the potential for accidents is high. The County has recently begun a campaign for pedestrian traffic safety, but can avoid a problem here but refusing to modify the pre-existing zoning.

The neighbors surrounding the proposed location would like to preserve the remnants of our rural residential neighborhood. The existing zoning regulations exist for a reason- the site is not suitable for a school with 180 children.

I urge the Planning Board, Office of Zoning and the Board of Appeals to deny this request for modification of the existing zoning regulations.



We are writing to make it known that we are opposed to the proposed Winchester School on Georgia Avenue in Olney, MD.

We live on the north side of Cherry Valley Drive in Olney, which is the side that borders the (school) property. Although our house is a little further down and does not border it directly, we are very close and we feel there are many reasons why this is not a suitable location for this facility. Here are some of our views:

- 1) Since this is such a small piece of land (for a school) in a residential area, there are several houses very close to the property. When the owners bought these homes there was just a regular residential house on this land, and they had no idea that there might be a school right next to them. We understand that many schools have housing near the property, but they are usually separated by streets and trees and large fields.
- 2) There is a gravel driveway which is actually shown on the Montgomery County map as "Rockhill Lane", but it is just a personal driveway that goes back to one house which borders the back portion of the (school) property. This driveway runs directly beside the property on the south side and behind the houses on the north side of Cherry Valley Dr. We're sure that many cars will mistakenly turn into this driveway and there is no where to turn around until you reach the house at the end.



3) We do not feel this property will accommodate this facility and its parking needs. Its patrons will have to park along the side streets, the closest, and really the only usable one, being Cherry Valley, which is not a very safe road for children (believe us, we know we have 2 children). People drive fast on this road and there are no curbs or sidewalks.

Also, we do not want our street lined with parked cars all day, and when there are no curbs people tend to park on the grass area, which damages our lawns.

- 4) Because of likely poor parking and driveway area, traffic would probably back up onto Georgia Ave. causing hazardous situations.
- 5) There is no direct turn into this property going north on Georgia Ave., meaning that drivers would have to go to the next street (Hines Rd.) and make a u-turn, causing more traffic problems.

We ask that the Winchester School seek another more appropriate location that would be less dangerous and less disruptive. We hope that the Board of Appeals will deny the petition for Special Exception No. S-2604.. Thank you for hearing our concerns.

I am vehemently opposed to the proposed location of the Winchester School at 17320 Georgia Avenue in Otney MD.

The proposed site is much too small for the establishment of such a facility in a residential area. If you and your staff would visit the site, you would find that the tayout and space is not sufficient to accommodate such a facility, and that the noise, congestion and traffic situation would become untenable.

My property borders the proposed Winchester School site, and I am quite concerned about the increased traffic on Georgia Avenue and on Cherry Valley Drive. I know from experience that a school will create traffic backups and improperty parked vehicles on the neighboring streets. I would anticipate that parents would park on Cherry Valley Orive and children would attempt to take short-cuts across private property in order to get to the school. In a worse case, we could expect people to actually ettempt to stop along the shoulders of or on the median of Georgia Avenue. During any kind of special event, the parking and traffic would become a disaster.

It is already difficult to get out onto Georgia Ave during the rush, having a school tiere would only exacerbate the situation.

Lam concerned about the excessive noise level that would be introduced by having a school rocated at 17320 Georgia Avenue. Just the existing traffic on Georgia Avenue is already quite sufficiently noisy, and the addition of extre treffic created by the school, and the significant addition of the constant noises associated with a very large number of children would make the situation unbearable. It is not unusual me to be sleeping until 8 or 9 am in order to accommodate my work schedule, and the incession deems of over a hundred children would make that quite difficult.

This letter is to strongly oppose the proposed location of the Winchester School at 17320 Georgia Avenue in Olney, Maryland.

As someone who has lived immediately adjacent to the proposed site since 1999, I have no doubt that the proposed site is too small to accommodate such an establishment, and it would be excessively disruptive to the community. The transportation and parking problems (because the site does not have enough parking spaces to accommodate such traffic) would create a very dangerous traffic situation on Georgia Ave and surrounding community streets that are currently already heavily congested. This would not only be a danger for the community but also for students and their parents, the majority of whom that favors this move (if not all) probably have no idea what the traffic situation is like where we are unless they live among us in the region.

The proposed site is simply not suitable, and we encourage the Winchester School to seek another more appropriate location.

We in the community therefore strongly encourage that the Board of Appeals for Montgomery County MD and Montgomery County Planning Board deny the above referenced petition for Special Exception, No S-2604.
