



Damascus Bypass Study

The Planning Board is soliciting public opinion about a proposal by the County Council's staff to the Council's Planning, Housing, and Economic Development (PHED) Committee to reserve land for a bypass around the west side of Damascus. Such a bypass would not be considered for construction until 15-20 years from now. The concern that has been raised is that although traffic forecasts predict that traffic congestion in Damascus will be tolerable through Year 2025, continuing growth beyond the County boundary could result in unacceptable conditions in Damascus after 2025. The purpose of the bypass would be to divert future through traffic from Carroll, Howard, and Frederick Counties away from the Damascus Town Center and many of the residential neighborhoods along MD 27.


Specifically, the proposal is to reserve land for a two-lane roadway (one lane in each direction) and a bikeway (bike lanes or a separated shared use trail) within generally an 80'-wide right-of-way. The bypass would intersect with existing and potential future public roads, but would not have private driveways connected to it. There are two routes currently under consideration for reservation, based on current review of a 1991 alignment feasibility study:

Potential Damascus Bypass Routes



Dear Mrs. Praisner:

I have known you as a councilmember for many years. I first saw you at my Political Science class at Montgomery College. Michael Subin was our professor/councilmember and my mother and I were taking his class. You were the guest speaker.

After that, I saw you from time to time at a Taxpayer's League meeting, Civic Fed event, plea before the council for historic preservation of Moneysworth Farm, or other occasion. I watched you lovingly tend to Betty

Ann Krahnke.

I am writing to you now out of respect for your position, because I believe in you, and because I trust the principles that you and Mr. Subin have tried to demonstrate by teaching and by example throughout the years. They are, that government works only if the people care enough to make it work, that in our republic everyone should have equal representation, that good judgment is based on informed decisions, and that fairness of process is important.

This brings us to the issue currently at hand--something that has the mundane title of "Upper Montgomery County/Damascus transportation concerns."

As you know, I had several consultations and meetings with a Damascus developer regarding my mother's property interests. He was an engaging soul, and we had a cordial relationship. At that time, a substantial offer was suggested for a portion of her property—the part which is located across from Gue Road. The developer stated that his long-term vision for Damascus was to have a tollroad or private road which would run from Damascus Manor Drive, encircling the town, and meet with Ridge Road at Gue. (By coincidence, my mom also owned the envisioned origin of the road at Damascus Manor Drive.)

I told him tha my mom was an avid environmenalist, was very protective of the headwaters, and would never agree to any road, or "covering the earth with asphalt," as she would put it. Her farm was "not for sale."

During this time the Master Plan process was being conducted. Various comittee meetings, including the transportation comittee, were held. In the transportation comittee, both planners and citizens agreed, after much discussion, that comprehensive regional traffic management should include consultation and coordination with the state and with counties to the north. Citizens and planners agreed that the impact of the Woodfield Road Extension should be evaluated before there was the creation of a new road.

This decision was consistent with previous approved Master Plans which were approved by the County Council.

Damascus is not Clarksburg. Citizens and planners worked closely and productively throughout the process. Yes, there were many heated discussions, but issues were resolved. The Damascus Master Plan, which is a good reflection of the wishes of it's residents, should not be penalized by extraneous disputes. Neither are Damascus residents a bunch of hicks,

A comprehensive, multi-jurisdictional program seemed the most logical approach to Damascus traffic concerns. This was a thoughtful, informed, well-researched decision, based upon environmental concerns, up-to-date SHA projections, and citizen consultations.

You can imagine, then, the extreme surprise when, at the very last minute, this issue was raised yet again, and, yet again, appeared to

originate from the same source.

I am writing to you now, because I believe that in order for you to do your job to your best capacity, you should be fully informed. You need to make decisions based only on the merits of the argument. There are many factors you must take into consideration when formulating a policy for the community. You know best how to evaluate all the information that is placed before you. You have led us by example--I can only try to rely on your best judgment by keeping you informed.
