# Public Hearing M-NCPPC Master Plan for Historic Preservation Eligibility – Falkland Apartments December 6, 2007 Barbara Goldberg Goldman

Good Afternoon. I am Barbara Goldberg Goldman and Co-Chair of the Affordable Housing Conference of Montgomery County, MD, and the County Executive's Affordable Housing Task Force. However, I want to make it perfectly clear and without any question now and in the future, that I am here today before you representing only myself as an individual resident of Montgomery County. I am not testifying on behalf of any government or organizational entity. I am here because I am extraordinarily sympathetic to the dilemma that is facing you as government officials and our County's residents. In certain situations, it is entirely plausible to be proactive. In certain situations, it is entirely plausible to be reactive. But in all situations it is necessary to be thoughtful. When we act impulsively the risk of making mistakes is greater than if we take a deep breath, stand back and think about the long-term ramifications of our decision.

No one would argue, especially I, that Montgomery County is in the midst of a stark, painstaking and very serious housing crisis. Therefore, I strongly endorse any and all opportunities for the County to acquire, develop and maintain decent, safe and affordable housing units as they become available. Highest priority must be given to those units and other developments near and around metro transit hubs. Yet, I find myself torn in this situation with the Falklands. The state of the state of the number of new and preserved affordable units to be developed on the three parcels. Yet, I do not want to compromise the architectural integrity of the entire development, and the history that it so beautifully represents. I believe that it is critical that a range of affordable units be preserved and created while adhering to principals and values that have been engrained in me by our forefathers. Namely, learn from the past, and appreciate and care for the resources and beauty with which it has provided us.

I am sympathetic towards the efforts of Home Properties to develop 133 MPDUs on the North parcel and also support their agreement with AIM to provide 49 units in its Woodleaf community for the Rent Supplement Program beginning May 2009 and extending for a period of 20 years. I am aware that in the event the County discontinues the Rent Supplement Program during the 20 years, Home has agreed to convert these units to MPDUs for the remainder of the term. In working with AIM, Home has also agreed, for a period of 20 years from construction completion of the North Parcel buildings, to commit 50 units in the new North Parcel and 50 units in existing buildings in the East and West Parcels to rents within the range of the workforce housing guidelines as promulgated under Montgomery County Regulation No. 18-06AM. In summary, this means that Home will provide 282 affordable, workforce, and MPDU housing units if its project is approved as scheduled. But, at the moment, the rent

structure at the Falklands is not entirely what we call "affordable." With rents in the range of \$1200.00 to \$1700.00 per month, we must carefully examine what it is we are trading.

I further understand that Home Properties also has agreed to waive application fees and transfer the security deposit from Falkland North to another Home-owned property for any resident who is in good standing and relocates to another Home Properties community. For residents relocating to a community not owned by Home Properties, Home will pay the reasonable application fee and security deposit offset against any security deposit refund due from Falkland. Home will also pay \$500 of residents' relocation (moving, utility hook-up, and the like) expenses or such other amount as may be required by County law. Home is promising to go beyond what we sometimes see in developments of this magnitude and it is to be lauded for its efforts. Yet, I am concerned that the households affected by temporary relocation do not, in general, have sufficient savings to cover unexpected relocation costs. If some form of Home's proposal is accepted, Home should also consider the creation of a cushion account or fund to cover additional unexpected costs that might arise for some households.

But, one of my main concerns is that we must look to the future. Part of the housing crisis we are facing today is due to past planning—planning that clearly was not able to predict Montgomery County's 21<sup>st</sup> century incredible growth pattern and progress. In fact, we are told that Falkland was a successful "experiment providing large-scale multifamily housing for people of moderate means, in pleasant surroundings with ample green space." Designed by Louis Justement, one of the most notable mid-century designers and urban planners, the Falklands development was widely celebrated in the architectural journals of the time. But clearly, there was no vision as to how such a development might be integrated into a growing community some sixty or seventy years later. Currently there are 182 units on the north parcel. Today, we know that this number is not sufficient to begin to accommodate our needs now and in the future. And yet, it would be a crime to destroy structures that reflect a time that was entwined in the New Deal history and significant in the history of community planning. The complex was the first garden apartment complex in Montgomery County with over 300 garden apartments identified in the region, built 1930s-40s.

So, we face a major dilemma. How do we maintain and highlight the significance of this historic landmark that was given Honorable Mention at the 1940 International Congress of Architects, and is located in our own backyard, while at the same time in our own backyard, and near a metro station, provide the housing that we so desperately need? Clearly, this is not a simple matter requiring no simple solution. It goes directly to the heart and life of our entire Community. I know you well enough to know that you will not make your decision lightly. Surely, there must be a compromise solution that will permit our County to carefully examine any and all options, push the envelope and devise creative ways to accomplish a development that in sixty years from now will be looked upon as wise, cutting edge, and all the while preserving and respecting the beauty and significance of the past. 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### TESTIMONY TO PLANNING BOARD IN SUPPORT OF THE INCLUSION OF THE FALKLAND APARTMENTS IN THE COUNTY MASTER PLAN OF HISTORIC PLACES

I am Jim Humphrey, Chair of the MCCF Planning and Land Use Committee, testifying on behalf of the Federation. At the March 2005 meeting of the Civic Federation, the delegates approved a resolution supporting the placement of the Falkland Apartments in Silver Spring on the Locational Atlas and Index of Historic Sites because we believed then, as we still do today, that the Falklands are a jewel of architectural history to be cherished and preserved.

The Falklands was one of the first in the nation of a style of multi-family housing developments that gave us the term "garden apartment." And, it could be argued that it is the best remaining example of how these projects were successfully integrated into both the natural and the built environment. The three sections of the Falklands exhibit a bravado in their fusion with this topographically challenging site, and beautifully demonstrate the diversity of approach to the siting of "garden apartments"—the eastern portion situated in the divergence of 16th Street and Colesville Road, with its central courtyard green area; the western portion merging into the woods on a rise atop a branch of Rock Creek; and, the northern portion woven around a deep stream gorge and stand of 100-year-old or so oak trees, between the B&O railroad tracks and the historically important East-West Highway.

The Falklands would certainly rank as the first stop on a heritage tourism visit to the area, and the marketing of an architectural heritage tour could be a real asset to Silver Spring's economic development. There is more to be preserved here, however, than a relic of a historically important style of architecture. There are environmental assets worth preserving as well, in the form of greenspace in which residents can walk their dogs, toss a ball with their children, or spread a blanket and have a picnic. And there is the important forested area on the northern section, which becomes more valuable every day as our urban tree canopy falls victim to redevelopment. The Falklands is also a community of people, important to the Federation because decades ago the residents formed the first citizens association of renters in the county.

Historic designation of the Falklands will also meet the goals and objectives of other county policies and plans. One of the housing goals in the county General Plan is the preservation of existing affordably priced housing, and this development is comprised of hundreds of dwelling units affordable to workforce income level households or below. When the County Executive's Task Force on Affordable Housing issued its recommendations last month, preservation of affordable units was their number one issue-

"Market pressures are making both rental and ownership housing more expensive in Montgomery County. Households who rent are particularly at risk. It is a goal of Montgomery County to retain and preserve the affordable rental housing stock..."

Another General Plan housing objective is to encourage and maintain a wide choice of housing types. Silver Spring will certainly see its fair share of multi-family housing provided in high rise, mixed use buildings. But there is only one Falkland Apartments. Please recommend its preservation. Thank you.

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## Summary of Testimony – Falklands Apartments Montgomery County Planning Board hearing, December 6, 2007

The Falkland Apartments complex meets several criteria for designation on the Montgomery County Master Plan for Historic Preservation.

The entire parcel of 22 acres should be included in the designation.

The task at hand is to evaluate the significance of the Falkland Apartments in the context of Montgomery County and Maryland history, architecture, and culture -- not to judge any possible proposal for change to the property.

### Testimony to Planning Board on Falkland Apartments Historic Preservation Eligibility - 12/6/07

I'm Wayne Goldstein, president of Montgomery Preservation, Inc. (MPI) testifying before this body for the third time concerning historic designation of the Falkland Apartments. The evidence continues to be overwhelming that this resource meets three of Section 24A-3(b)'s historic criteria, (1)(a), (1)(d) and (2)(a). You have heard and will hear from the largest and most distinguished group of historic preservation professionals ever to testify about a county historic resource that they consider to have national as well as state and local significance. I fully expect the Falkland Apartments to be found eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) by the Keeper of the Register, who, within the next six months, will agree with the current recommendation for such eligibility by the Maryland Historical Trust.

In fact, based on statements made on a Home Properties website about the Falkland Apartments, I can state with confidence that the owner already acknowledges this property meets the criteria and could easily support actual listing on the NRHP and on the county's Master Plan for Historic Preservation (MPHP). Consider these quotes:

"... Takes the initiative to designate all of the buildings in the East and West Parcels, in addition to the Cupola Building, as historic and have them indicated as such in the Master Plan to guarantee that these parcels will not be redeveloped... To confirm this commitment, we will agree to the designation of the East and West Parcels as historic and will invest considerable funds for their restoration and preservation... We agree that the community is very desirable and beautiful. We also agree that Eleanor Roosevelt did cut the ribbon at the opening of the East Parcel in 1937 which provided a high profile demonstration of support for her husband's New Deal policies."

There are other statements, long since refuted by the many experts who support this designation, such as the claim that the Falkland Apartments is merely a copy of other garden apartments. If Home Properties truly believed that, then it would make no sense for it to ever voluntarily acquiesce to designation. However, since this owner is offering to support the designation of two of the three sections, then it acknowledges that the entire Falkland Apartments meets the criteria to be designated. At this point, we could all agree to the designation and forward it to the County Council for its swift approval.

However, Home Properties wants to bargain about this matter and has taken a number of actions that it believes makes its bargain attractive. If today were, say, December 6th, 2008, and the Falkland Apartments, having already been designated, were the subject of an Historic Area Work Permit being presented to the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) to allow for demolition and new construction on the north section, a detailed discussion of all of the facts concerning this proferred bargain would be appropriate and necessary to discuss. After all, Section 24A-8(b)(6) states that the HPC can balance "the interests of the public in preserving the historic site... with the interests of the public from the use and benefit of the alternative proposal," and if it finds that "the general public welfare is better served by granting the permit", it can do so.

But today, the only issue is whether or not the Falkland Apartments meets one, two, or three of the criteria listed in Section 24A-3. That is all that can and should be decided today. Any other discussion of any other issues that do not address the historic criteria is immaterial to the worksession and action that will follow this public hearing. However, I can assure this Board that I have thoroughly acquainted myself with facts and history about this county's affordable housing, Home Properties, Harris-Teeter, Action in Montgomery (AIM), the Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF), and the late Saul Alinsky.

If you're curious, ask me what happened when Home Properties sold the Pavilion Apartments in Rockville to a condo converter in 2005 for a huge profit and how profitable the Falkland Apartments currently are. Or you can ask me about Harris-Teeter's 28-year long consent decree with the National Labor Relations Board. Or perhaps you'd like to know more about AIM, the IAF, and Mr, Alinsky. I'll leave you with one final thought. If Saul Alinsky were alive today, I have no doubt that he would, with their permission, be organizing the tenants of the Falkland Apartments to oppose Home Properties' and AIM's plans for them.

# Testimony by the Maryland Native Plant Society Regarding eligibility of the Falkland Chase Apartments for Master Plan Designation December 6, 2007

For the record, I am John Parrish representing the Maryland Native Plant Society. We urge the Planning board to approve the staff recommendation finding the Falkland Apartments eligible for Master Plan Designation.

We believe it is important to preserve the natural history and environmental setting at Falklands. We offer the following comments for your consideration.

- 1. The natural setting is part and parcel, and complementary to, the historic garden style apartments. Both the setting and the apartments are irreplaceable natural and cultural resources combined in a unique and sensitive way. They reflect Silver Spring's rich history.
- 2. Along with Jesup Blair Park, the Falkland sectors within the Central Business District (CBD) (east of 16<sup>th</sup> Street) comprise the last significant stands of native trees and greenspace in downtown Silver Spring.
- 3. The right fork of Fenwick Branch of Rock Creek currently begins in a ravine as an underground spring on the North Sector grounds and emerges above ground flowing through the South Sector before entering Washington D.C. at Portal Street. This stream is the only natural free-flowing stream remaining in the CBD. It was intentionally preserved by the Falklands designer to enhance the environmental setting and quality of life for residents of the apartment complex. The springhead ravine and stream alone should deserve historic preservation simply because they represent the last naturally functioning tributary within the Silver Spring CBD. According to topographic maps from 1917 and 1929, the stream used to flow above ground within the area that became the North Sector, beginning close to the railroad tracks. Due to a steady increase of impervious surfaces and reduced groundwater infiltration over many decades, the stream's baseflow has been significantly reduced. Consequently, the stream now emerges in the South Sector immediately south of East-West Highway. Redevelopment within the streams headwaters in the north sector would reduce groundwater infiltration and further degrade the stream.
- 4. The stream bank and surrounding buffer area in the Northern and Southern Sectors support 13 species of native forest trees reflecting the original forested landscape at Falklands. These are remnant stands of trees comprised of Red, White and Black Oaks, two kinds of Hickories, Black Walnut, American Elm, Black Cherry, Black Locust, Sassafras, Tulip-tree, Sycamore, and Red Maple.
- 5. Fifteen species of trees growing at Falklands are represented by specimen-sized individuals. The Northern sector alone supports 9 species of specimen trees, including several stately White Pines standing prominently as sentinels easily seen from the surrounding area. Trees of this size and age are not replaceable within our lifetimes.

- 6. All told, there are at least 38 species of trees (both native and non-native) growing within the complex, 10 of these are showy springtime flowering species. They include cherries, dogwoods, redbuds, juneberries, hawthorns, crabapples and yellowwood. Several of the flowering trees date to the original plantings. One is a county- champion hawthorn growing on the North Sector grounds.
- 7. Three of the 7 visions of the Maryland Planning Act apply to Falklands:

Vision #2: states that "sensitive areas are to be protected." In this case, the stream and its buffer area are best protected under existing conditions. Re-development would inevitably degrade or destroy the stream by altering the existing natural drainage patterns.

Vision #4: "Stewardship of the Chesapeake Bay and the land is to be considered a universal ethic." Given that this is the last stream and greenspace to survive urbanization within the CBD, it would be wise to preserve it and not condemn it to the fate of the original 'Silver Spring.'

Vision #5: "Conservation of resources, including a reduction in resource consumption is to be practiced." In other words, historic preservation equals natural resource conservation. Imagine what would be required to dispose of the Falkland complex and think of all of the non-renewable natural resources necessary to reconstruct new buildings if redevelopment were to occur. In addition, the land would have to be re-graded resulting in the destruction of the natural rock outcroppings, trees and natural contours that presently exist. What a waste of natural resources that would be.

- 8. The mature trees currently serve to reduce the urban heat island effect by transpiring moisture to the atmosphere and subsequently cooling the surrounding urban atmosphere through evaporation.
- 9. The trees and other vegetation at Falklands offer relief from the concrete streetscape and harshness of high rise buildings. Most importantly, the greenery complements the garden style apartments.
- 10. In conclusion, the Falklands have already been compromised by the loss of one sector that became the Lenox high-rise. The remaining complex provides important continuity of natural and cultural history within the rapidly changing Silver Spring CBD. Falkland Chase stands apart from most of Silver Spring because it represents the *geography of somewhere* a special sense of place and identity. By contrast, re-development represents a *geography of nowhere* that is already too plentiful throughout the rest of Silver Spring.

Again, the Maryland Native Plant Society strongly urges the Planning Board to designate the entire Falkland complex as eligible for the Historic Preservation Master Plan and continue the process of preserving the last few remaining natural and historic resources in Silver Spring.

My name is Mary Reardon. I'm Preservation Chair of the Silver Spring Historical Society.

Losing the north sector of Falkland is not a compromise. It's what Home Properties wanted all along. If someone can take something valuable from you but decides to take less, I don't call it a compromise.

I would prefer to confine my remarks to Falkland's historic character, which is what this hearing it about. But other issues are being raised, and I feel we have to address them.

Wayne Goldstein, Jim Humphrey, and I – we are all affordable housing advocates. I organized tenants in several cities as well as Silver Spring. I see Falkland as a tenant rights issue as well as a preservation issue, the rights of the Falkland tenants.

The County's affordable housing program is broader than MPDUs, or bargaining with developers for more units. And it's fine to get as many affordable units as we can, even though incrementally. But when a relatively few affordable units is on the table – few relative to the vast need – is it really worth destroying a valuable historic resource and upending the lives of tenants? Homeowners would never be forced to move for a social policy, nor would they stand for it if the homes across the street from them were torn down and replaced with a mammoth housing complex.

Market rents for apartments at Falkland are below average for the CBD. And remember that people who have lived there a couple of years or more pay below the advertised rents.

As for smart growth, I'll read from a letter sent by DC planner John Fondersmith:

"I understand the importance of smart growth and transit oriented development and indeed, I generally favor such an approach. However, transit oriented development must involve more than a rubber stamp or cookie cutter development approach. I was involved in initial transit development planning in Washington, D.C. in the early 1970s as the first phases of the Metrorail system were being constructed....We quickly realized the need to be sensitive to the unique character of individual station areas and to plan for creating a sense of place, trying to ensure that each station area has a unique quality. This often involved utilizing the special quality of historic buildings.."

#### 16<sup>th</sup> St. slide:

We're here today to continue a process begun 5 years ago when the historic inventory of downtown Silver Spring buildings opened the door to a review of all properties 50 years and older for potential designation

I want to point out that the owner knew when he negotiated to purchase Falkland that this County inventory was underway. Falkland was the most likely of the properties to be designated as a result. In fact, Home Properties closed the deal about a month after the Planning Board voted to list Falkland on the Locational Atlas.

#### Site Plan Slide

You can see how large the endangered north sector is. Maryland Historical Trust is well aware of the loss of 34 of the 484 units on the Draper Triangle. Yet they have indicated that the property is eligible for National Register after we filed a nomination in 2004, and reiterated it in a letter you received this week.

#### Roosevelt slide

There are three reasons for Falkland's significance.

First is its connection with the **New Deal**. Falkland was the **second apartment complex** in the country to be underwritten by the New Deal's Federal Housing Administration. These New deal projects influenced suburban development.

Eleanor Roosevelt cut the ribbon when Falkland opened in 1937 to celebrate the success of this program for moderate income people, like those pouring into Washington to work on New Deal programs. The owner of Falkland likes to point out that she cut the ribbon on the *south* parcel, not the *north* parcel. But the north and west parcels were underway at the time. And James Blair, the developer, intended to have the project cover all three parcels, referring to them collectively as "Falkland Properties." It was ONE project.

#### Prototype slide

Falkland and Colonial Village in Arlington were among the DC-area models for middle-income apartments nationally, over the next generation. This is from the *Washington Post*, 1937. Falkland is at the top.

#### Sunnyside slide

The second reason for Falkland's significance was that it's part of a proud line of early multifamily projects that adopted the English Garden City principles as imported by Stein and Wright. Generous green space and low-rise construction were key components, making this relatively dense housing a pleasant community.

Sunnyside Gardens in Queens was the first such project. All of these developments I'll show you are on the National Register, even though all made allowances for cars over the years.

#### Radburn slide

Radburn in New Jersey is another.

All of these early projects were built in stages, as Falkland was. But no one considers any parts less important than others, nor would suggest the parts are separate properties.

#### Chatham Village slide

In Chatham Village, the topography dominated the plan more than at the two others. It's more like Falkland in that regard. Chatham Village was named one of the 10 Great Neighborhoods for 2007 by the American Planning Association.

#### Colonial Village slide

Close to home, we have Colonial Village, also on the National Register and sandwiched between two metro stops. This was the first large scale rental housing project in the U.S. to be backed by FHA mortgage insurance, just before Falkland.

#### Falkland site plan

Falkland's design was dictated by the topography, which is why every sector is unique. The architect, Louis Justement said, for example, that he deliberately retained the y-shaped stream valley in the north and south sectors.

By the way, Falkland was widely celebrated in contemporary architectural journals, during and after construction. This is from the *Architectural Record*.

#### **Picketing Slide**

The third reason for Falkland's significance is now part of its history. That is, literally generations of Silver Spring and County activists joined Falkland tenants to defend the site whenever it was threatened. The late Senator Ida Mae Garrott was among them. Here's a photo in the *Evening Star* from 1972. Their reasons for defending Falkland were to preserve affordable housing AND because of its architectural and historic merit. And people from the close-in DC neighborhoods joined in, petitioning the County Council to spare Falkland.

#### Aerial slide

The green space in Falkland is a major value. This aerial view is from 1955, but the same abundant green space exists today. Falkland and Jesup Blair Park together comprise the last significant stands of native trees and green space in downtown Silver Spring.

#### Slide of Falkland green areas

Wherever you live in Falkland you can look out and see trees. And the buildings facing major streets are set back with grassy frontage. At left is the stream bed on the north parcel.

#### Next 3 slides

In these next 3 slides I just want to point out that Falkland, though it has a variety of detailing on the buildings, has the same overall design on all 3 parcels. None is less significant than the other. This is a mix of photos from all 3 parcels.

#### Housing slide

We should not need to destroy in order to build. Please spare all of Falkland.

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# Testimony of Jerome Paige and Deborah M. Royster On behalf of The Civic League of North Portal Estates Before the Montgomery County Planning Board December 6, 2007

Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman and members of the Commission. Thank you for the opportunity to speak to you today about the proposed historic designation of the Falkland Chase Apartment Complex ("Falkland Chase").

The Civic League of North Portal Estates represents the approximate 200 homeowners of the Washington, D.C. neighborhood of North Portal Estates, which is located immediately adjacent to Falkland Chase.

On November 13, 2007, The Civic League of North Portal Estates voted unanimously to recommend the inclusion of all three parcels of the Falkland Chase Apartment Complex to be determined eligible for inclusion on Montgomery County's Master Plan for Historic Preservation. This recommendation is based on the unique historic and cultural significance of Falkland Chase, and on the potential adverse impact of the proposed development of the northern parcel of Falkland Chase on the surrounding Silver Spring and Washington, D.C. communities, including the neighborhood of North Portal Estates.

Falkland Chase is an important part of the Washington, D.C./Silver Spring community. Its historical legacy as one of the first large scale, federally financed workforce housing projects contributes to the rich socioeconomic diversity of our community. In addition, the architectural design and scale of the buildings are consistent with the character of the single family homes that dominate the bordering upper northwest communities of Shepherd Park and North Portal Estates. This design, characterized by abundant trees and green space, is aesthetically pleasing and creates a seamless appearance between the two jurisdictions of Washington, D.C. and Montgomery County.

We are very concerned about the potential adverse impact of the proposed development of Falkland Chase on the surrounding communities, including our neighborhood of North Portal Estates. This project would significantly increase the population density in an area that is already congested. In addition, traffic is a significant concern at the intersections of 16<sup>th</sup> Street and East-West Highway and Colesville Road, and it is likely to be exacerbated by the proposed project. The proposed development would also result in the significant loss of trees and green space that contribute to the unique beauty and culture of the hidden gem known as the "Northern Corner" -- the park-like setting adjacent to federal Rock Creek Park that is enjoyed by residents of the District of Columbia and Silver Spring alike.

This is not the first time that the residents of North Portal Estates have supported the preservation of Falkland Chase. In the 1970's, our residents appeared before the Montgomery County Council in opposition to a planned redevelopment of Falkland Chase. Fortunately, Montgomery County decided against proceeding with the project at that time. Once again, we urge you today to preserve the unique historic, cultural, and aesthetic legacy of Falkland Chase for the benefit of future generations.

Finally, we are mindful of the large number of new projects that are currently planned and/or under construction in Silver Spring. We urge you to be cognizant of the impact of Falkland Chase and other planned projects on surrounding residential neighborhoods, including the bordering Washington, D.C. communities of North Portal Estates, Shepherd Park, and Colonial Village. Although not directly within your jurisdiction, the quality of life in these communities is profoundly affected by development activities in Silver Spring that are within your purview. Washington, D.C. residents are beneficiaries of certain of these initiatives. For example, we applaud Montgomery County for its initiative in rebuilding downtown Silver Spring into a vibrant community center that we all enjoy. However, we urge caution in approving development projects that adversely affect the adjoining, well-established neighborhoods of Silver Spring and Washington, D.C. that are critical components of the rich historic, cultural and aesthetic character of the wonderful, shared community – irrespective of jurisdictional boundaries – that we call home.

Good afternoon, Planning Board Members:

My name is Rebecca Brillhart. I serve as the clergy co-chair of Action In Montgomery (AIM) and am also a pastor at Sligo Adventist Church in Takoma Park, Maryland--a 3,000-member congregation that represents more than 85 nationalities. We share a campus with Washington Adventist Hospital and Columbia Union College.

Affordable housing is a chronic, everyday issue on the hearts and in the minds of many of my members and their neighbors who live in this county. We run the gamut when it comes to Montgomery County, with members living in Takoma Park/East Silver Spring and all the way to Damascus. Our support of this exemption for Falkland North is because of the one-for-one replacement of affordable housing, the significant amount of workforce housing, and because it would provide dense housing next to a metro station.

As you know, the Falkland Chase apartments were built in the 1930's as part of President Roosevelt's *New Deal* to provide housing for moderate income, working families. Now, in the Montgomery County we know today, December 2007, we are facing some of the same challenges to make housing affordable.

In Action In Montgomery's 29 member congregations, we have been hearing more than an identification of affordable housing as a "problem." We have been experiencing a mourning, a *deep* mourning, for a time when people's children could afford to move back to the county after completing college without living in their parents' basements to make ends meet; when teachers, nurses, county employees and police officers could afford to live where they serve; where people who had worked a lifetime and invested in a community could plan to retire here.

Because of the significant loss of affordable housing in the county, we are again in a time when we need another New Deal. We need a New Deal so that our families can live near each other. We need a New Deal so our corps our county employees can forego commuting long distances and be close to the people they serve on a daily basis. We need a New Deal so that those who have invested in our communities with their lives do not need to leave when they need their community most, as in their retirement years. In my congregation, we say goodbye to too many folks who find they must move out of county to be tended to by total strangers. This is not just "too bad." It is devastating and rips at the very fabric of a community.

Home Properties redevelopment, with 182 MPDUs and 100 workforce housing units, will preserve the original *intent* of the New Deal housing, while also preserving two parcels of

historic buildings. We believe Home Properties is offering a New kind of Deal for Montgomery County, a unique example of how a developer can and will work to increase affordable housing for those who need it. I urge you to support it.

Testimony for Park and Planning Hearing Concerning Falkland North Development and Historic Preservation

Rev. Rachel Cornwell, Senior Pastor Woodside United Methodist Church, 8900 Georgia Avenue Silver Spring, MD 20810

#### **Background on Woodside UMC:**

We are currently an active congregation of around 400 families. Our church family is economically and culturally diverse—coming from 21 different nations. Many of our long time members live in the Woodside neighborhood. For many years, however, people had to move further from downtown Silver Spring to find affordable housing—we have people who come from as far away as Gaithersburg and Virginia. But most of our newer members are people who have recently moved into the revitalized downtown Silver Spring. Many of them live in apartment building around the church.

We have been part of the Silver Spring community for 135 years, in three different locations along Georgia Avenue. Each of our moves have been related to the development of Silver Spring, however we feel that we still have an historic presence within the community. We believe that the history of Silver Spring has less to do with buildings and more with the culture, the diversity and the ongoing vitality of our community.

### Why we support the development of Falkland North by Home Properties, Inc.:

- 1. As a congregation located and invested in the heart of downtown Silver Spring, we see the benefits of the public use and amenities of this development project.
- 2. As a congregation that is growing with young professionals and young families and that strongly values our cultural and economic diversity, we support this development because it represents "smart growth" and also promises to provide more affordable and market-rate rental units.
- 3. As a member congregation of Action in Montgomery, we feel that this project is in line with our goals of increasing affordable housing in the county and that the developer is also working on issues related to pedestrian safety.

#### **Personal Testimony:**

I am a new Silver Spring resident—I live in the church parsonage in the Woodside neighborhood. I am personally concerned about affordable housing, because even on two incomes, my family could not afford to buy the home we live in today. As a parent with one (soon to be two) child/ren in the Woodlin Elementary School District, I am aware and concerned with the school issues related to development in Silver Spring. However, my family very much enjoys the urban life that we have by living close to downtown Silver Spring. We feel that living within walking distance to the Metro, several groceries stores, parks,

and a library all offer a high quality of life. I believe that more people should have the opportunity to have this quality of life—and that that was the historic intent of the original Falkland development for working people in Silver Spring. I believe that this new development is in keeping with the spirit of the original development and expands the opportunity to have a convenient, rich and affordable lifestyle to more working people in the Silver Spring community.

#### HISTORIC PRESERVATION OF FALKLAND-CHASE

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Mary Sinclair Jacobs, President, Charter House Residents Association, Inc.

Landmark proprieties are cornerstones of a healthy informed society. Preservation is the trademark of sound business practices. Nine acres comprises the Falkland-Chase Property of family homes, gardens, trees, and a natural stream bed at the corner of 16<sup>th</sup> Street in Silver Spring, Maryland at the opposite end of the White House of the United States of America. This 9 acres site should be treated the same as the White House's 82 acres at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, NW, Washington, DC because they share a rich history. The cornerstone for the White House was laid October 13, 1792 and the Falkland-Chase 1936-38. The White House stands gracefully as an example of preservation and retrofitting. We should learn something from history through preservation of precious housing stock that is soundly constructed.

Displacement is a most traumatic experience. In my opinion It ranks very close to losing a love one. At 72 years old I was among the over 200 residents 55+ in age, who were displaced from The Charter House Apartments on November 30, 2006. Residents of The Charter House were fortunate to have the tax payers of Maryland to pick up most of the tab and were also fortunate to be able to return to a building, known as our home; in spite of the over 290 code violations which are fixable. Now!

- 1. Does Parks and Planning have a plan in place to relocate the residents from Falkland-Chase?
- 2. Does Parks and Planning have a financial plan available to house the displaced residents from Falkland-Chase?
- 3. Will Parks and Planning be responsible for and will pay for the displaced residents while the destruction and construction go forward?
- 4. Does Parks and Planning have knowledge of a phase in plan program while construction is in progress?
- 5. Does Parks and Planning have a plan in place for the residents who will return to qualify for an apartment at the same rate as to when they were forced to leave?

Should another humpty-dumpty towering structure continue to compromise our health? We need <u>livable</u> housing communities. Further, the surrounding community shall inherit noise pollution, suffocating heat, blocked out sunlight, and inhalation of more filthy unhealthy air from vehicular traffic jams. Good Lord, how will Homeland Security deal with this congested corridor for an evacuation plan?

No replacement will make up for destruction of one's life and livelihood. There is evidence that reconstruction is half the cost rather than tearing down sound structures to start from scratch. These same issues will be re-hashed in about 10 to 20 years before a different group of faces, unless some gut wrenching decision is made now to stop the need to be a disposable society. Destroying this landmark property will not solve the availability nor affordability issues of rental housing in this community. None so blind as one who will not

see, except through greed-grinded lens.

This landmark property known as the Falkland-Chase should continue to stand in tact as the cornerstone of a wealthy neighborhood in Silver Spring, Montgomery County, MD. In closing, any resident that is evacuated or displaced is without a home...this person is homeless.

Thank you.

I am a current resident of Falkland-Chase Apartments and I am holding copies of over 50 signatures of other current residents who, like me, are imploring the Planning Board to accept the Historic Preservation Commission's recommendation to save Falkland, our home, by designating the entire Falkland complex as historic.

I first discovered Falkland-Chase, (or Falkland, as it was called then) back in 1972 and lived with my roommate in the SW segment. I rediscovered Falkland two years ago on a visit here from Michigan where I had been living. I was absolutely thrilled to see the landmark buildings still standing and continuing to serve as a visual gateway to Maryland from D.C. I moved back to Falkland last November, this time in the North section. I truly felt I could come home again.

But sometime after I moved in I learned that part of Falkland, where I was living, was in danger of being demolished. Once I realized that this was not a done deal as I had been led to believe by the management, I helped to gather tenant signatures.

Without exception, 100 percent of the residents I asked to sign the letter did so without hesitation. And, I should add that also without exception, the residents I talked to either thought the proposed tear-down was a certainty and that they had no say in what would happen to their home, or they had no idea whatsoever that such a plan existed. The latter was the case with Mr. Abese Mengesita who has lived at Falkland for 9 years. But, both responses are not surprising because Home Properties tries to keep residents either misinformed or totally uninformed. Case in point, a flyer I put in my building was immediately torn down by Home Properties staff.

I don't believe that anyone else has asked the people living at Falkland how they feel about the proposal or what they want. I asked representatives of AIM if they, themselves, had talked to the residents and got no response. AIM seems to think that displacing 182 households and destroying historic buildings is justified by making a deal with the developer to get a few dozen lower-priced apartments in White Oak. Why should current residents pay the price so that AIM can put a feather in their cap? How dare they tell me where I and the rest of the current residents living in the North section of Falkland may live. Why should we and Falkland be the band aid for Montgomery County's affordable housing problem?

The residents I spoke with love living at Falkland and do not want to be forced to move. They chose Falkland for many reasons, including diversity of residents, green, open spaces and a sense of community. Falkland is a safe place where residents plant flowers and herb gardens and put carved pumpkins on the stone walls at Halloween. Even Home Properties' website touts Falkland as having "the unique extra...mature landscaping not found in most urban apartment communities." Ironic that Home Properties is willing to use the rarity of the setting as a selling point while preparing to obliterate the very same.

It simply is not very logical to dismember the Falkland complex, declaring one-third less historic and less important than the remaining two-thirds. When signing up to rent at Falkland there is nothing distinguishing the sections; all were designed by the same architect; and the north parcel not only is joined to the south by a streambed which runs under East-West Highway, but also by an underground tunnel still used by maintenance staff to get from one section to the other. Why, now would one section not be considered historic while the other two are? It might make more sense to explore developing a high-rise housing project on the parcel that contains the Rite Aid and the Kinkos and backs up on the metro.

The fate of Falkland currently rests with you, the Montgomery County Planning Board. I urge you, on behalf of myself and the 50+ residents who signed the letter thus far, to please save all of the Falkland-Chase Apartments and designate the entire complex as an historic landmark so that the buildings will remain as the important part of Silver Spring that they have always been since Eleanor Roosevelt cut the opening ribbon in 1937.

Falkland Historic Designation Hearing Before Planning Board, December 6, 2007 Louis Justement, Architect

Statement by Marcie Stickle, Silver Spring Historical Society Advocacy Chair, 12/6/07

The extraordinary expertise of architect and progressive city planner Louis Justement continues to be unearthed, new information revealed. Extensive research has been carried out about this exceptional architect and the New Deal Falkland Garden Apartments over the last 20 years:

(1) Andrea Rebeck, registered and restoration architect, calls Justement an architectural "master" in her 1987 "Montgomery County in the Early Twentieth Century, A Study of Historical and Architectural Themes," completed for the Montgomery County Historic Preservation Commission and the Maryland Historical Trust, 12/87. She was engaged to survey the County and bring the Locational Atlas into the 20th Century. She places Justement in the same company as Frank Lloyd Wright and John Eberson, of "national prominence" ("Theme VI: C. Important Buildings, or Works by "Masters," p. 30). She recommends The Falkland's placement on the National Register.

"He developed a design which combined masterful site planning with a novel mixture of townhouse units placed among apartment blocks. The success of this project encouraged a number of similar developments in the Southern portion of the County" . . . . p. 10.

Andrea Rebeck also states: "The first garden apartment complex in Montgomery County, and by far the largest and most ambitious, was the Falkland Apartments built in 1936-1938 by the Blair family on part of their former farm in Silver Spring. The Falkland's architect, Louis Justement, studied many projects for moderate income families, including Colonial Village in Arlington, Va., and Chatham Village near Pittsburgh."

Justement: "An existing Y-shaped valley has been carefully preserved and this has permitted the retention of practically every tree on the original site. The use of courts opening on the surrounding streets permits greater variety in appearance and a more economical use of the land, while providing the same density per acre as typical row housing. The preservation of existing trees provides privacy as well as agreeable surroundings. The living porches generally face the rear garden and there are play areas for small children," "New Cities for Old," pp. 140-141.

Justement won professional acclaim for his Falklands project.

(2) American Architects Directory, 1962, 2nd Edition, notes Falklands won an international award, an Honorable Mention from the Fifth Pan American Congress of Architects, 1940. Justement also designed Howard University Law School, Medical School, Administration Building; Sibley Memorial Hospital; the Meridian Hotel, which won an Award of Merit from the Washington Board of Trade, 1942. In 1921, won two out of three first prizes in the "National Own Your Own Home Competition." Admitted to AIA in 1921.

(3) "In 1946, he was one of only eight architects elected a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects, the highest honor the profession can bestow on its peers," Karel Yasko, FAIA, Counselor for Fine Arts & Historic Preservation, and assistant commissioner for design and construction, General Services Administration, 10/84, letter to County Council.

"Previous to the award, the leading architectural magazine in 1938 in extensive coverage cited Falkland as a prime example of multiple housing in its concept and planning advances. Through these publications Falkland had a great influence on post-war housing planning, beyond the borders of Montgomery County."

"Within the architectural profession, he [Justement] was held in great esteem . . . and established a national reputation for his urban planning and housing," Karel Yasko, Ibid., 1984.

(4) Justement's 1952 E. Barrett Prettyman Federal (United States) Courthouse on Constitution Ave. is National Register eligible, and a contributing building to the Pennsylvania Avenue National Historic Site, according to the Wash., D.C., Preservation Office, and the D.C. Preservation League, 3/28/05. The Pa. Ave. National Historic Site extends from Capitol Hill to the White House.

Justement's Federal Courthouse is also on the General Services Administration Fine Arts & Arts Commissions' Historic Properties List, National Capital Region. Prettyman Courthouse is included in an American Institute for Architects Guidebook.

Justement was awarded the contract for the design, drawing and specification preparation of the new Courthouse in 1945; **Harry Truman laid its cornerstone in June 1950**, according to the Federal Courthouse Web site:

"On September 5, 1945, the Commissioner of Public Buildings awarded a contract to local architect Louis Justement for the design, drawing and specification preparation of the new courthouse. The District of Columbia officially deeded Reservation 10 to the federal government in 1949. Louis Justement generally conformed to the stripped classical styles and massing of the surrounding buildings, but the spacial arrangements and site planning for the E. Barrett Prettyman Federal Courthouse differed from its neighbors. New technologies, such as fluorescent lighting and air conditioning, allowed Louis Justement to abandon the previous structures' courtyard plan-type, and arrange rooms within a large, continuous floor plate. Louis Justement's work was approved on January 14, 1948, and ground was broken in August of 1949. On June 27, 1950, the first day of the Korean War, President Harry S. Truman laid the cornerstone, and the building opened in November of 1952."

- (5) Justement's Harris & Ewing Photographic Studio, is on the National Register, 1311-1313 F St., N.W., D.C., 1900-1924, in Renaissance style, added 1994. At that time of his design, he was junior partner of Sonneman & Justement.

It is important to note that the Planning Board in 2003 said that for Locational Atlas for Historic Properties designation "it's either the Falkland or the Saint Charles (Garden) Apartments"; in 2003 the Planning Board decided that the entire Falklands should be placed on the Locational Atlas. Sadly, we just recently lost the St. Charles and its environmental setting, including a huge catalpa tree green home to the residents' beloved mocking bird.

Falkland Garden Apartments: Testimony of Support for Master Plan Status (Entire Site), before the Planning Board, 12/06/07, by George French, 510 Albany Ave, Takoma Park, MD, SSHS Treasurer.

I have had over 30 years experience in the construction trades and I have worked on historic homes from Georgetown to Germantown. Including the Water's house and bank barn and the Belle Dawson House both owned by the Montgomery County Historical Society. The Loughborough House in Bethesda, and the Bratenal House (Bishop's quarters) and the Headmaster of St. Alban's home, both owned by the National Cathedral.

The Falkland Apartments are a significant historic resource that begs for the highest measure of protection from Montgomery County for the enjoyment of all that visit or live there. They are an important part of our county, state and national heritage. The HPC has already confirmed the importance of this historic treasure many times, as has this planning board twice lately for Historical Atlas listing. I am glad to see the Falkland owners legal challenge against Locational Atlas listing has been dismissed, a challenge that was due only to a purported error of procedure, not based on architectural merit, that was shamefully exploited by the owners and their legal team. Please affirm the place of Falkland in its totality in our County heritage as a Master Plan Resource.

The case for including Falkland in the atlas has grown stronger over the past two years and support has increased.

Many preservationists were hoping for a thematic historic district for Garden Apartments as recommended by the consultant that conducted the CBD historical survey in 2003. There are so many interesting Garden Apartments worthy of designation, notably the exquisite and recently demolished St. Charles, but paramount in importance is Falkland.

Here the architect Justement respected the site topography and worked with the natural contours and features of the land. There are the original daylighted Brooks running through two sections (now intermittent in the north parcel), and behind the third (west sector) with stands of native trees significant in size and importance. Rock outcroppings retained by the architect and builder, dot the property and each enhance the natural setting and thus the aesthetic enjoyment of the area. The common areas are full of trees, gardens and green space, surrounded by architectural beauty, free from the noise and pollution of the city outside, which is how it was designed. Buildings facing the major thoroughfares have generous setbacks and trees in front. Looking from one section toward another the major thoroughfares and traffic seem to disappear and Falkland becomes continuous.

Each section has uniqueness, but all are connected by a common unifying theme in the Colonial Revival style, including the creation of courts and yards, separated by brick or stone low-rise walls. There is symmetry and order to the building layout in all quadrants, showing the extraordinary degree of planning involved, considering the natural, but desirable lay of the land.

Adjoining buildings are staggered or of a different style so as not to give the impression of row houses, but allow for a variety of apartment types and comparable densities. The side-gable buildings, all of white brick, except for one, are interspersed with the flat-roof parapet buildings, which are natural brick, except for two designed to be white brick in one courtyard. A few of the free standing gable-roof buildings have full gable returns on each end, facing front and back, with fireplaces and brick masonry chimneys.

Each section has a hidden array or two, of brick car garages, reminiscent of horse stables or carriage houses. One of these supports a ninety-foot cylindrical smokestack, constructed of square brick, possibly the incinerator or part of the power plant. There are oculi windows over many entrances.

Some are circular with eight radial panes others vertically elongated and octagonal with nine panes. All double-sash windows throughout the project are six over six in the Colonial style. All have louvered shutters. Flemish bonding of the exterior brick walls is prevalent throughout.

There is a variety of intriguing entrances. Some have porticos with fluted columns. Some have beveled limestone surrounds leading into a recessed double entryway with a quarry tile floor. Some have flush limestone casing or brick design with matching dentils. The corner entrances have quarter conical or tent-like copper roofs with square columns. Quoins (the architectural corner ornamentation) are limestone or recessed brick. Watercourses can be stone or quarter round brick. Some of the buildings have stone foundations. Stringcourses are of limestone, staggered brick and even some stone. Other architectural aspects have been well documented.

Falkland is steeped in history and character in an extraordinary environmental setting with impeccable architectural significance.

We are not so desperate for housing in the Silver Spring CBD that we need to give up this irreplaceable outstanding historic resource. New multifamily housing approved, under construction, or recently completed since 2002 equal about 3700 units. Adding in proposed projects brings the total of new units to over 5000, not including the Falkland North proposal.

This massive proposal would build 1059 new units in towers and another supermarket in an area already choked by traffic, the largest housing development ever constructed in downtown Silver Spring (the Blairs are larger, but the Blairs are several complexes and in any case stretch over 27 acres). We are in danger of sinking in a sea of concrete high-rises in the SS CBD. Smart growth aside, we should draw the line somewhere and Falkland is, of course, the logical and crucial place.

Testimony Before the Planning Board in Support of Adding the Falkland Apartment Complex to the County's Master Plan for Historic Preservation, December 6, 2007

For the record, I am Anne Ambler, speaking on behalf of the Sierra Club, Montgomery County Group. My testimony reflects our Executive Committee's vote on this issue in February 2007. The Audubon Naturalist Society also supports this statement.

The Sierra Club's mantra has long been dense development close to rapid transit, a key component of Smart Growth. But Smart Growth is not just high rises and mixed use around Metro stations; it is also creation or preservation of a sense of place through excellent design, variety, historical continuity, and moments of green respite.

Is it "smart," then, to consign to the landfill a well-designed, artistically detailed, solidly built, historically and environmentally significant complex of below market rate apartments? We don't think so, and strongly support the recommendation of the Historic Preservation Commission to add the entire Falkland Apartment complex to the County's Master Plan for Historic Preservation.

Last Saturday here I heard experts lament the lack of design in modern urban America. But in 1936 when the Blairs began to build Falkland, their architect Louis Justement paid considerable attention to the layout of the buildings, the detail of their facades, the variety of their frontages and roof lines, and the *environmental attributes of the site*, which he intentionally preserved.

As to these attributes, Falkland's remnant forest of large native trees--oaks, hickories, locusts, sassafras, tulips, red maples, black walnut, and even American elms--provide a shade break for refugees from the Silver Spring "heat island" and remove carbon dioxide from the air. All three sectors of the Falkland property have a wide variety of trees, some planted at construction; many predating construction. The north parcel, currently most at risk, contains nine species of specimen trees. These trees need the protection that the Master Plan can provide.

Architect Justement wrote: "..an existing Y-shaped valley has been carefully preserved." Indeed, this Rock Creek tributary that originates in the north sector and continues in the southeast sector is the last above-ground stream in downtown Silver Spring. Will we lose this one as well?

The Falkland complex provides precious, irreplaceable green space and variety —much-needed amenities in this CBD, host to over 5,000 new, approved, under construction, and proposed units, exclusive of the Falkland proposal, with more surely coming.

We preserved the Silver Theater and the B&O Station as landmarks of Silver Spring. We also preserved the corner strip mall at Georgia Ave. & Colesville Rd., totally out of place in an urban setting. But the strip mall adds the sense of place and historical continuity to Silver Spring. So too should we preserve the Falkland complex, the Blair family legacy of social responsibility and environmental protection.

The Sierra Club urges you to add the entire Falkland Apartment complex to the County's Master Plan for Historic Preservation. This is an investment in the future of Silver Spring and the county. Thank you for your consideration.

I serve Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church as the Assistant Minister and Minister for Pastoral Care. While I am a called minister of the congregation, my views may not reflect those of all of our members.

Our members live all throughout the District and Montgomery County - with a large number in Silver Spring. The Cedar Lane congregation is about 860 adults, 300 children and a couple hundred loosely-affiliated "friends" of the church. Our annual budget is close to one million dollars. We are proud to be one of the founding communities of Action in Montgomery.

Our congregation has a long history of engaging with environmental issues through research, advocacy, prophetic witness from the pulpit and celebration of the Earth - its beauty and its many precious resources. Continuing this tradition, our congregation voted in March of 2007 to name global warming and environmental health the primary focus of our social justice resources this year. It is in this context that I come before you and ask you to consider the unique environmental benefits that the Home Properties development of Falkland North would offer the County.

The Falkland North project would create more green space in downtown Silver Spring by renovating and opening a one-acre park on the east parcel. As Silver Spring grows in density, it is the rare project that offers to increase the amount of park land that can be enjoyed by all residents and visitors of the city.

The Falkland North proposal is in harmony with a model of "Smart Growth" by situating more than 1000 units of housing within 700 yards of a Metro station and in close proximity to stores, doctor's offices and other amenities. With the critical need to decrease carbon emissions in our environment, this development would allow more Montgomery County residents to commute to work and school and live active lives without needing a car.

In addition, Home Properties plans to build Falkland North and its other new development in Silver Spring (on East-West Highway) in compliance with "green building" standards.

And, finally, there are few properties in Montgomery County with so much land in such close proximity to a Metro station that it would be difficult to transfer this environmentally-sound model to another area of Silver Spring. This makes support of the Falkland North proposal all the more urgent.

We have this innovative opportunity with Home Properties and Falkland North. In the spirit of environmental stewardship, on behalf of the many residents whose lives would be enhanced by this project, I encourage you to clear the way for Home Properties to move forward uninhibited with their plans.

I understand that the Planning Board will evaluate the Falkland Apartments for eligibility for designation on the Montgomery County Master Plan for Historic Preservation on Detember 6, 2007, and would like to offer the following for your consideration. The Falkland complex is included in the Maryland Inventory of Historic Properties as M:36-12. This office believes it is also eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

The Falkland Apartments is an outstanding example of a 1930s garden apartment complex, designed by prominent architect Louis Justement. The first garden apartment complex in Montgomery County, and the first large-scale rental housing project in Maryland whose mortgage was backed by the Federal Housing Administration, the property is associated with significant trends in housing development during the Depression era. It derives additional significance from its association with the Garden City movement of the period, whose principles are eviden in its site planning and design, providing quality, affordable housing in pleasant surroundings. The entire range of resources occupying the entire 22-acre parcel is integral to its significance, and the loss of any portion of the complex would compromise the National Register eligibility of the remainder.

Testimony of Dr. David Rotenstein to the Montgomery County Planning Board 6 December 2007 Evaluation for Master Plan for Historic Preservation Eligibility, Falkland Apartments, Locational Atlas Resource #36/12

Good afternoon. For the record, I am David Rotenstein, a member of the Historic Preservation Commission.

The Montgomery County Historic Preservation Commission has determined that the Falklands Apartments merits designation in the Montgomery County Master Plan for Historic Preservation. The Falkland Apartments are listed in the Montgomery County Locational Atlas and Index of Historic Sites. The HPC held a hearing at its August 15, 2007, meeting to evaluate whether the Falkland Apartments merits designation in the Master Plan for Historic Preservation and we heard testimony from the preservation proponents who nominated the property and from the property owners and their representatives. In its review, the HPC found that the Falkland Apartments meets three of the nine criteria codified at Chapter 24-A of the Montgomery County Code for designation in the Master Plan for Historic Preservation. We found that the Falkland Apartments merits designation in the Master Plan.

In its consideration of *Locational Atlas* resources that are subject to demolition plans, Montgomery County Code requires the planning board make a determination of eligibility for designation, considering criteria related to a property's historical and cultural significance as well as its architectural and design significance. Historic preservation staff have determined that the Falkland Apartments is eligible for designation for its historical and cultural associations *and* its architectural and landscape qualities. Our responsibilities today are to evaluate not future land uses but how the Falkland community does or does not meet the criteria for designation. Proposed land uses at this site are a separate topic and should be the subject of future Planning Board discussions.

This is the second time I have had the opportunity as a member of the Historic Preservation Commission to hear a case related to the historical significance of the Falkland Apartments; the first was in the spring of 2005. I voted enthusiastically to support adding the property to the *Locational Atlas* back then and I voted this past August that the property meets the designation criteria for addition to the *Master Plan for Historic Preservation*. My votes were informed by the outstanding scholarship documenting the property by the Silver Spring Historical Society and its collaborators as well as the thorough analysis by Historic Preservation Section staff in their application of Montgomery County's designation criteria. I also based my votes on more than two decades of professional experience in historic preservation documenting and evaluating buildings and landscapes under federal, state, and local historic preservation laws. The Falkland Apartments property meets and indeed exceeds the minimum criteria established by law in the Montgomery County Code for designation in the *Master Plan for Historic Preservation*. This is a conclusion reached by eminent historians and architectural historians with expertise in twentieth century architecture, urbanism, and social history, as evidenced by the

many letters of support written to the Board, as well as the County's expert historic preservation staff.

The three parcels on which the Falkland Apartments were constructed in two phases between 1936 and 1938 collectively tell a story about Montgomery County's past that resonates loudly and clearly in the twenty-first century. Montgomery County is a chapter in an American history that also includes chapters a few miles to the south in Washington and in Pittsburgh, Arlington, and New York City. It is a story about economics, aesthetics, and pragmatism.

A basic human need is the requirement for safe, decent, and affordable housing. The Falkland Apartments and its counterparts throughout the United States were built at a time of economic crisis when private sector investment in real estate and construction was constricting in the grip of Depression. Conceived at a time when Garden City design principles and public sector interventions combined to spur the construction of garden apartment communities throughout the nation, the Falkland Apartments provide a three-dimensional view of Silver Spring and the county on the eve of the Second World War. Workers were drawn to the Washington metropolitan area in search of federal jobs and along with them came needs for housing, infrastructure, and retail enterprises. The Falkland Apartments created affordable density on a humane scale in a safe and aesthetically pleasing environment.

The Falkland community has physical ties to Silver Spring's historic commercial district, commuter rail, and civic institutions. As a whole, all three parcels and the buildings with their associated landscapes are dynamic living symbols of Silver Spring's interwar development and postwar boom. Unlike other historic properties in Montgomery County that survive as mere shells of their former appearances and uses, the Falkland Apartments of 2007 recapitulates the Falkland Apartments of 1940 in location, design, materials, setting, feeling and, in that dimension that makes historic properties relevant to today, use.

The Falkland Apartments property merits designation as a Montgomery County historic district. I ask that the Montgomery County Planning Board join the other regulatory agencies who have reviewed the Falkland Apartments' significance in local, state, and even national history and who have found that the district warrants the protection afforded by designation as a legally recognized historic property. The HPC furthermore supports "Option 2" as presented in your staff report and recommends that the Planning Board direct staff to prepare an amendment to the *Master Plan for Historic Preservation* for the HPC and other reviewing bodies to review in the near future. In accordance with Montgomery County Code Chapter 24A, the Planning Board should vote to find all three parcels comprising the Falkland Apartments eligible for designation.

#### Background:-

- 1. On September 5, 1985, the Montgomery County Planning Board transmitted to the Montgomery County Council a Final Draft Amendment to the Historic Preservation Master Plan indicating the Falkland Apartments as not suitable for regulation under the Historic Preservation Ordinance, Chapter 24A of the Montgomery County Code.
- 2. Sites found unsuitable for designation are listed in an appendix to the Master Plan for Historic Preservation in order to clarify that such sites have been reviewed and considered but excluded from historic designation and therefore not subject to protection and limitation under the Historic Preservation Ordinance.
- 3. The Montgomery County Planning Board has recommended to the Council that the marginal historic significance of the Falkland Apartments do not outweigh the importance of the property in implementing two major goals of the Silver Spring Sector Plan: 1) spurring economic development in the Silver Spring CBD, and 2) providing addition residential opportunities in close proximity of METRO.
- 4. The Montgomery County Historic Preservation Commission has recommended to the County Council that the entire Falkland Apartment complex be designated for historic preservation for the following reasons:
  - Falkland was a prototype for garden apartment development, community building, and site planning in Montgomery County.
  - Falkland is an example of the classical design elements which have evolved from the "Garden City" movement.
  - As one of the first three projects insured by the Federal Housing Administration (FHA), Falkland served as a model for subsequent projects.
  - Falkland's architect, Louis Justement, pioneered a new aspect of architectural practice--and his plan for Falkland represents the work of a "Master" in this emerging field of "environmental architecture."
  - Falkland is a landmark entrance to Montgomery County on Sixteenth Street

- 5. On October 23, 1984, the Montgomery County Council held a public hearing regarding the Final Draft Amendment to the Master Plan for Historic Preservation, at which time testimony was presented for and against the designation of the Falkland Apartments as an historic resource.
- 6. On April 19, 1985, the Planning, Housing and Economic Development Committee reviewed the public hearing testimony, and the issues raised in connection with the master plan amendment.
- 7. The Planning, Housing and Economic Development Committee was advised at the April 19, 1985 meeting that the prospective redevelopers of the Falkland property are committed to rehabilitating and retaining 450 of the Falkland Apartments as low-rise, garden apartments for a minimum of fifteen (15) years.
- 8. It was the position of the Planning, Housing and Economic Development Committee and was so recommended to the County Council, that only that portion of the Falkland Apartments identified as the 'cupola building' be designated for historic preservation, and that the remainder of the complex be listed in the appendix of the Historic Preservation Master Plan as not suitable for historic preservation.
- 9. On June 11, 1985, the Montgomery County Council reviewed the proposed Final Draft Amendment to the Historic Preservation Master Plan, and the recommendation of the Planning, Housing and Economic Development Committee.

#### Action

For these reasons, the County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland, sitting as the District Council for that portion of the Maryland-Washington Regional District in Montgomery County, Maryland approves the following resolution:

The Master Plan for Historic Preservation is hereby amended as follows:

- Designate the portion of the Falkland Apartment complex known as the 'cupola building', located at 8301 Colesville Road, in Silver Spring, as suitable for regulation under the Historic Preservation Ordinance, Chapter 24A, of the Montgomery County Code.
- Indicate in the appendix to the Master Plan for Historic Preservation that the balance of the Falkland Apartment complex has been reviewed and found not suitable for regulation under the Historic Preservation Ordinance.

This is a correct copy of Council action.
